

Locality Planning Belfast Information Update 16/10/25



We want to inform you of important changes within the Children's Services Planning Team that will affect how we deliver support going forward.

Due to recent staffing changes, two full-time posts are currently vacant and the team is now operating with significantly reduced capacity.

Despite our best efforts to maintain the level of support we've provided over the years, we must now refocus on our core responsibilities as outlined in our work plan. This decision has not been taken lightly.

The additional support we've offered, ranging from attending events, providing training, assisting with Task Groups, and contributing to local planning has been a valued part of our Partnership. However, to safeguard the wellbeing of our remaining staff and ensure continuity in our core functions, we must reduce the extra support we've been providing.


To help manage this transition, we ask that all future requests for support including updates to the CYPSP website, attendance at meetings or events, and general queries be directed to our central email address: cypsp@hscni.net. This will allow us to prioritise and allocate work more effectively, and avoid placing undue pressure on individual team members.

We remain committed to supporting the work of the CYPSP and will continue to collaborate closely with you. However, we ask for your understanding as we may not be able to meet all requests, and some responses may take longer than usual.

We also recognise that this change may require partners to take on more responsibility in progressing actions within Outcomes Groups, Locality Planning and associated Task Groups.

While this is a challenging time, we are confident that by working together and adapting how we collaborate, we can continue to make meaningful progress. Thank you for your partnership, your resilience, and your unwavering dedication to our shared goals.

As always, we remain happy to discuss any requests or concerns as required.





Using recycled scrap-store materials, little ones can discover textures, build, and create in their own playful way. A fun introduction to caring for our planet through play.



MYTHS & TRUTHS Housing Executive

MYTH:

Asylum seekers get a free house and move to the front of the queue.

TRUTH:

Housing for asylum seekers is the responsibility of the Home Office.

Asylum seekers are not eligible for social housing. Housing Executive and Housing Association properties are not used to house asylum seekers.

If an asylum seeker is granted 'leave to remain' they may then become eligible for social housing and related support. They will be assessed, as all applicants are, through the Housing Selection Scheme.

Asylum seekers do not have access to the mainstream benefit system. They have a parallel system of welfare support providing a weekly allowance.

In March 2023, there were 3,030 people receiving asylum support in Northern Ireland. Asylum support (sometimes referred to as 'NASS support') is available to asylum seekers who are destitute on arrival. (LCNI-briefing-refugee-statistics-July-2023-1.pdf)

This support may include the provision of accommodation pending assessment of their application for asylum.

MYTH:

Illegal migrants, migrant workers, asylum seekers and refugees are entitled to social housing.

TRUTH:

Not all people from abroad are entitled to social housing.

People who arrive here from other countries are not automatically eligible for social housing and many migrants do not seek to be housed in social housing.

There are legislative rules which specify criteria that people from abroad must meet to be considered for social housing which defines who is and is not eligible to go on the Social Housing Waiting list. It is clear in terms of immigration status and habitual residence.

The law is different for people from within the European Economic Area (EEA), the UK and other countries around the world.

MYTH:

New migrant workers, asylum seekers and refugees are jumping the queue for Housing Executive homes.

TRUTH:

The Common Selection Scheme for social housing does not award points based on nationality, ethnicity or religion.

All applicants for social housing complete the same application form. Individual needs are assessed using the published points-based Housing Selection Scheme. The Housing Executive will award points based on individual needs and housing situation. Those eligible are then placed on the Common Waiting List to be allocated a property for their selected areas of choice according to the rules of the scheme.

MYTH:

Asylum Seekers and Refugees are the same.

TRUTH:

An 'asylum seeker' is someone who is seeking asylum. This means they are applying to be given the status of a refugee in another country on the basis that they face persecution in their country of origin.

If an asylum seeker's application for asylum is granted by immigration officials, they become a 'refugee' in that country and are given either temporary or permanent leave to remain.

Only then would they be eligible for social housing, subject to the usual process of application and assessment.

MYTH:

The Housing Executive decides where migrant workers can live.

TRUTH:

Where migrant workers are eligible to apply for social housing, they are assessed under the Housing Selection Scheme.

The Housing Selection Scheme has been created to be fair and open and to give applicants a choice in where they wish to live.

When the Housing Executive has awarded an applicant points it will place them on the waiting list for their selected areas of choice. All applicants can choose as many areas as they want.

What should ideas focus on?

The two intended outcomes of the fund are part of the EastSide Early Learning Community

Framework (see Background below). Projects can focus on one or both outcomes, paying attention to
the one or more of the areas of focus beneath each:

Improve parental mental health and wellbeing

- Families are connected with and support each other through improved social support, awareness of resources and access to services
- Improved parental knowledge and ability to promote, protect positive mental health and well-being
- Parents are supported to become more resilient and better equipped to adapt to life challenges
- Families have access to appropriate support and services which allow them to be emotionally available parents; who are present, attuned and responsive to their children

Promote attuned and responsive parent/child interactions

- Improved attuned parental responses to child's initiations
- Increased parental understanding of the importance of parent/child interaction in relation to brain development and emotional security
- Parents have access to environments that model/coach/shine a light on attuned parent and child interactions



Your idea does not have to include all parts of the framework. You can choose to focus on one or more.

What is the opportunity?

This opportunity is designed to support projects working to address or remove health inequities within communities and build on the previous work of the EastSide Early Learning Community.

Projects should look to:

- Improve parental mental health and wellbeing
 - AND/OR
- Promote attuned and responsive parent/child interactions

Project ideas will focus on strengthening the foundations and the early years system for children 0-5 years old and/or their parents/caregivers living in East Belfast.

Each successful project will receive £5,000 to develop and deliver their idea. Projects are to be delivered between January and December 2026.

Transforming the Lives of Children in East Belfast



Background

Save the Children has been collaborating with partners in East Belfast to explore ways of finding sustainable solutions to improve early years outcomes for children. In 2020 we collaborated to create the EastSide Early Learning Community (ELC) through looking at the evidence of what we know works best for children's outcomes, understanding of the local context for families living in East Belfast and a mapping of the local early years system.

In the last five years, the EastSide ELC have worked together to develop a <u>framework</u> that includes the ingredients we believe will give us the best chance to create a system that will improve outcomes for children. We have developed a way of working to find long-term solutions, share resources, integrates a culture of learning and work with a shared vision.

This fund builds on the opportunities we have tested and learnt from over the years. It is designed to continue furthering the implementation of the framework as the guiding principle of all work in East Belfast that is focused on supporting children in their earliest years.

Who can apply?

The fund is open to:

- Groups, organisations and individuals that:
- Are registered as a constituted group or sponsored by a constituted group
- Have an up to date safeguarding policy approved by their board
- > Projects that will benefit children 0-5 year olds and/or the parents/caregivers living in East Belfast
- Projects that can be delivered between January-December 2026







What is the application process?

STEP 1- Projects will be invited to register for an ONLINE information sessions.

STEP 2- There will then be a simple Expression of Interest form for interested parties to complete.

STEP 3- Projects that meet the eligibility criteria will be invited to showcase their idea at an event with the community. This is part of our consensus grant making approach to this fund.

STEP 4- After the event, we will let successful projects know of the outcome. Funds will be released in January for projects to begin their planning and delivery.

Projects will then be invited to join quarterly reflective learning events and a final celebration event in 2027.

What will happen at the online information sessions?

At the online information sessions we will explain the criteria for the funding and the application process. We will also describe the consensus grant-making approach to project selection. And finally, we will talk about who can apply and what will be expected from successful projects.

We will also have a space for questions. There are two options to accommodate people's busy diaries. Both sessions will be the same. We strongly encourage those considering to apply to attend these sessions. If you are unable to attend one of the sessions please reach out to us.

What is consensus grant-making?

Consensus grant-making gives members of the community a say on how funding is allocated. As a child-rights based organisation, we are keen on exploring ways of ensuring children and their families have the power to make decisions about their lives, services they access and their communities. This approach is to facilitate child and family participation in the selection process.

Everyone at the showcase event will have an opportunity to vote for their favourite ideas!

What will I need to organise for the showcasing event?

The showcasing event is an opportunity to show children, families and practitioners in East Belfast what you are hoping to do. You will have a stand and can include as many details and props as you want. Your audience includes children and young people, you will need to think how you design your info for them. Make it fun!

You are invited to prepare a short 2-3 minute video which we will showcase on the day. You can also play it at your stand.

When will I find out if I am successful?

After the event we will tally the votes and inform successful candidates. We will let you know on or just after 01/12/25.



When am I meant to start and complete my project by?

Funds will be released for use at the beginning of January 2026, subject to our due diligence process. Projects can start once funds are received and are expected to finish by December 2026.

What are the reflective learning events? Are they mandatory?

Our quarterly reflective learning events are opportunities to come together in a facilitated space to share our experience of planning and delivering our projects. We hope these will be opportunities to encourage projects to think about what is working, what might not be working and what are the changes we can implement to get the best out of our projects.


We also hope these events encourage collaboration and relationship building amongst our various projects. Attending these events are part of the funding opportunity.

If you are not going to be able to join, you should let us know early and we can arrange an alternative option, like a one-to-one catch-up call. Dates and venues to be confirmed in January 2026.

How will I receive funds and when?

Funds will be released in two stages:

- > At the start of the project January 2026
- > Halfway through the life of the project- date to be agreed according to project timeline



We want you to develop and deliver a creative idea that intentionally looks at making an impact on the lives of children and their families, particularly around parental mental health and attuned child/parent interactions. We believe these are vital to help our children thrive

If you are successful, we would expect you to join us in several exciting events throughout the year:

- Launch event
- · Three quarterly reflective learning events
- Celebration event

Dates for these will be confirmed at the end of 2025.

What can I spend the money on?

You can spend the money on things like:

- · running costs for your project project activity costs
- one off events
- staff costs
- · training and facilitator costs
- transport
- volunteer expenses
- impact and evaluation







What will not be funded?

You cannot spend the money on the following items:

- · costs you've already paid for
- alcohol
- · contingency costs, loans, endowments or interest
- profit-making or fundraising activities
- VAT vou can reclaim
- · political or religious activities (we can fund religious organisations if the project benefits the wider community and does not include religious content)
- statutory services or activities
- overseas travel
- · pre-school provision funded by government
- projects that take place outside of East Belfast
- · activities that make a private profit
- giving cash directly to individuals


