development. A vocal wonderland, **BABBLE** is performed inside Replay's special Bubble – a magical indoor performance space. **Anna Newell** (Artistic Director) will introduce a short video presentation about **BABBLE** and talk about Replay's portfolio of work.

He recently wrote that 'Children who have normal non-verbal skills but a poor vocabulary at age 5 are one-and-a-half times more likely to have literacy difficulties or have mental health problems at age 34. The same group are more than twice as likely to be unemployed as those who have normally developing language at 5'.



Fionnuala McAndrew is Director of Social Care and Children. Fionnuala initially

trained as a teacher and moved into a social work career commencing in children's residential services. She has worked in a range of settings in local authorities in England and moved to Northern Ireland in 1996 to take up a post in the Southern Health and Social Care Board as Manager of the Registration and Inspection Unit, responsible for the registration of residential and nursing homes.

She was appointed Director of Social Care in the Southern Board in 2004 and became Director of Social Care and Children with the new Health and Social Care Board in April 2009.

Fionnuala McAndrew received an OBE in March 2012 for her services to healthcare in Northern Ireland.



Carlo Gébler was born in Dublin in 1954 to a literary family as he is the son

of Edna O'Brien, one of our foremost novelists. He was brought up in London and his diverse and versatile output includes novels, short stories, nonfiction, plays, children's books and an autobiography. Carlo says his primary ambition 'is to give readers imaginary worlds in which they can lose themselves'.

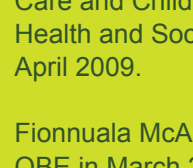
Carlo has worked extensively with young men in prison and is acutely aware of the prevalence of speech, language and communication issues in this group.

Anita Robinson is an Early Years teacher of many years classroom experience. As

teacher-in-residence at the Verbal Arts Centre she developed and delivered a language enhancement programme in primary schools throughout the Western Education and Library Board. Under the auspices of the Pushkin Trust she works with children and their teachers helping young people 'find a voice' through the creative arts. Anita writes a weekly column in the Irish News, has a regular comment slot on BBC Radio Foyle, contributes frequently to Radio Ulster and keeps in touch with her 'inner child' through story, poetry and creative writing workshops with children and adults.



Professor James Law, our keynote speaker, was a Speech and

Language Therapist for 8 years in east London and now leads Speech and Language at Newcastle University. His particular interest is in increasing the integration of research across disciplines. James has played a leading role in all recent national reviews of Speech, Language and Communication services. He is ideally placed to record the achievements, reflect on the challenges ahead and share his views on the future of Speech, Language and Communication services.



Janet Cooper leads an SLT team in Stoke-on-Trent and manages the 'Stoke Speaks

Out' campaign. Since its onset Stoke Speaks Out has reduced the incidence of speech and language delay from 64% to 39% for three year olds entering nursery. She believes that 'even before birth, mums can start by talking to their bump!'

The 'Now You're Talking' conference challenges each of us to go beyond discussing what needs to change to making change a reality.

Who better to inspire us in that purpose than a leader who has already achieved the improvements to which we each and we all must aspire?
