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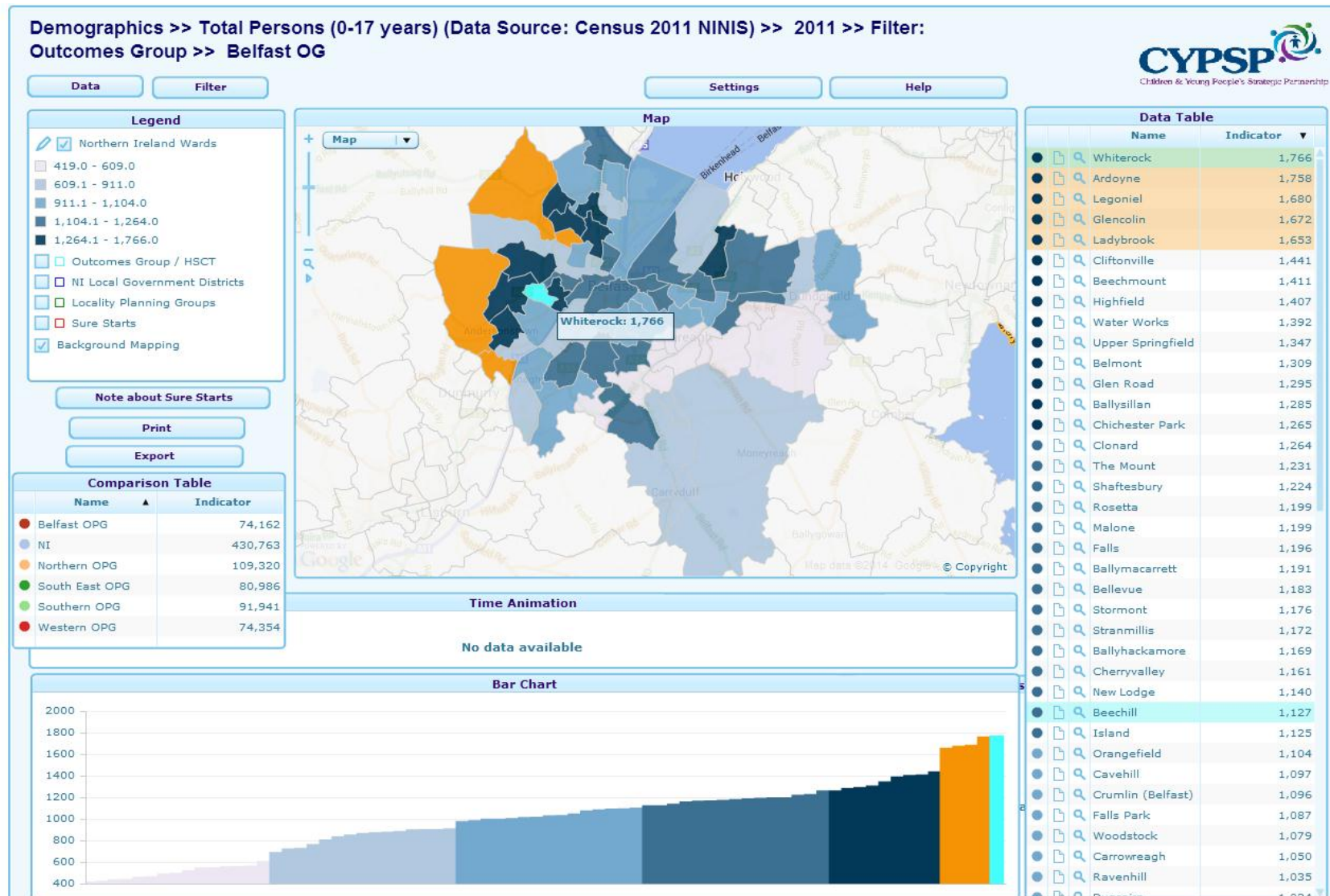
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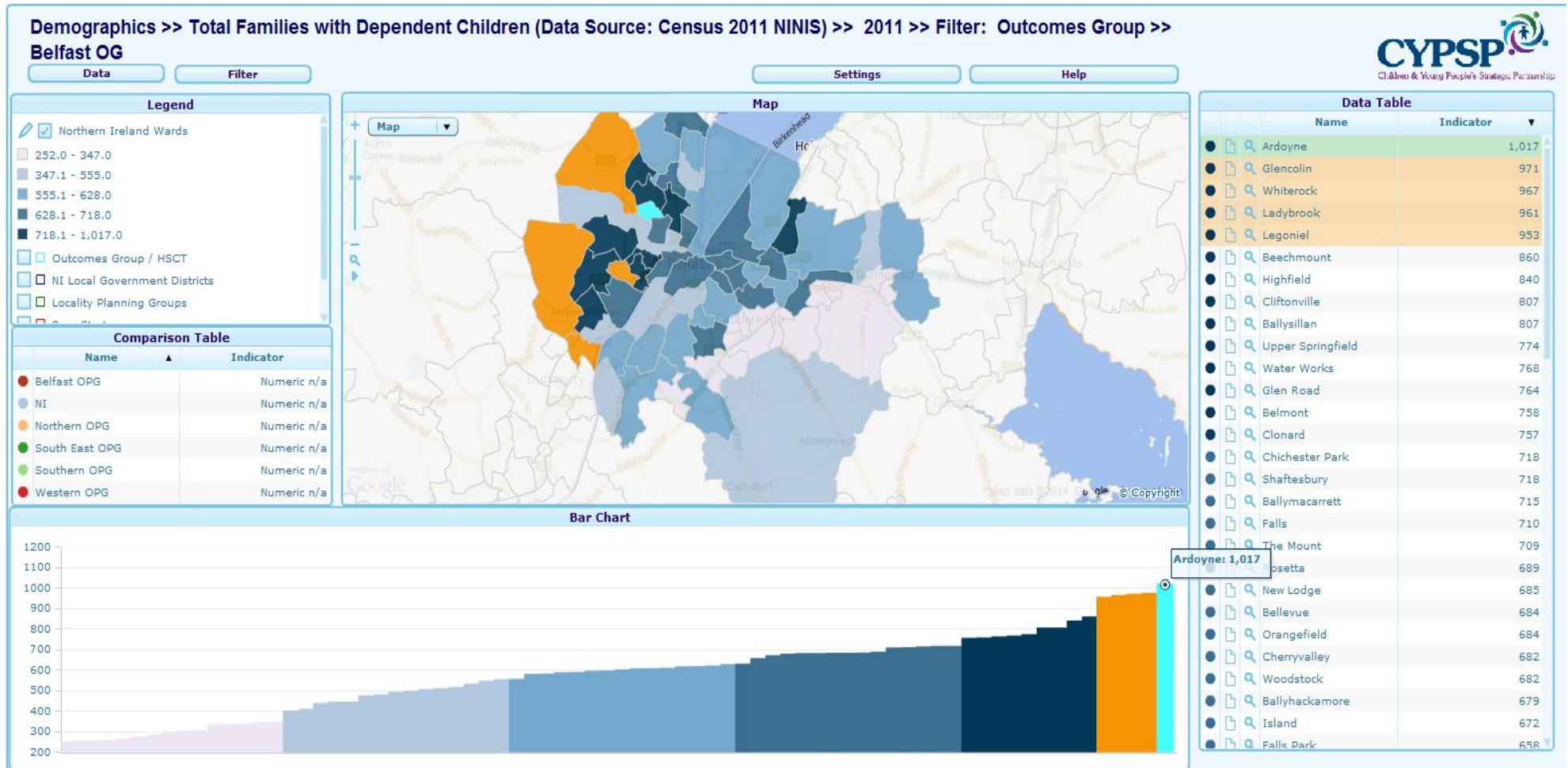

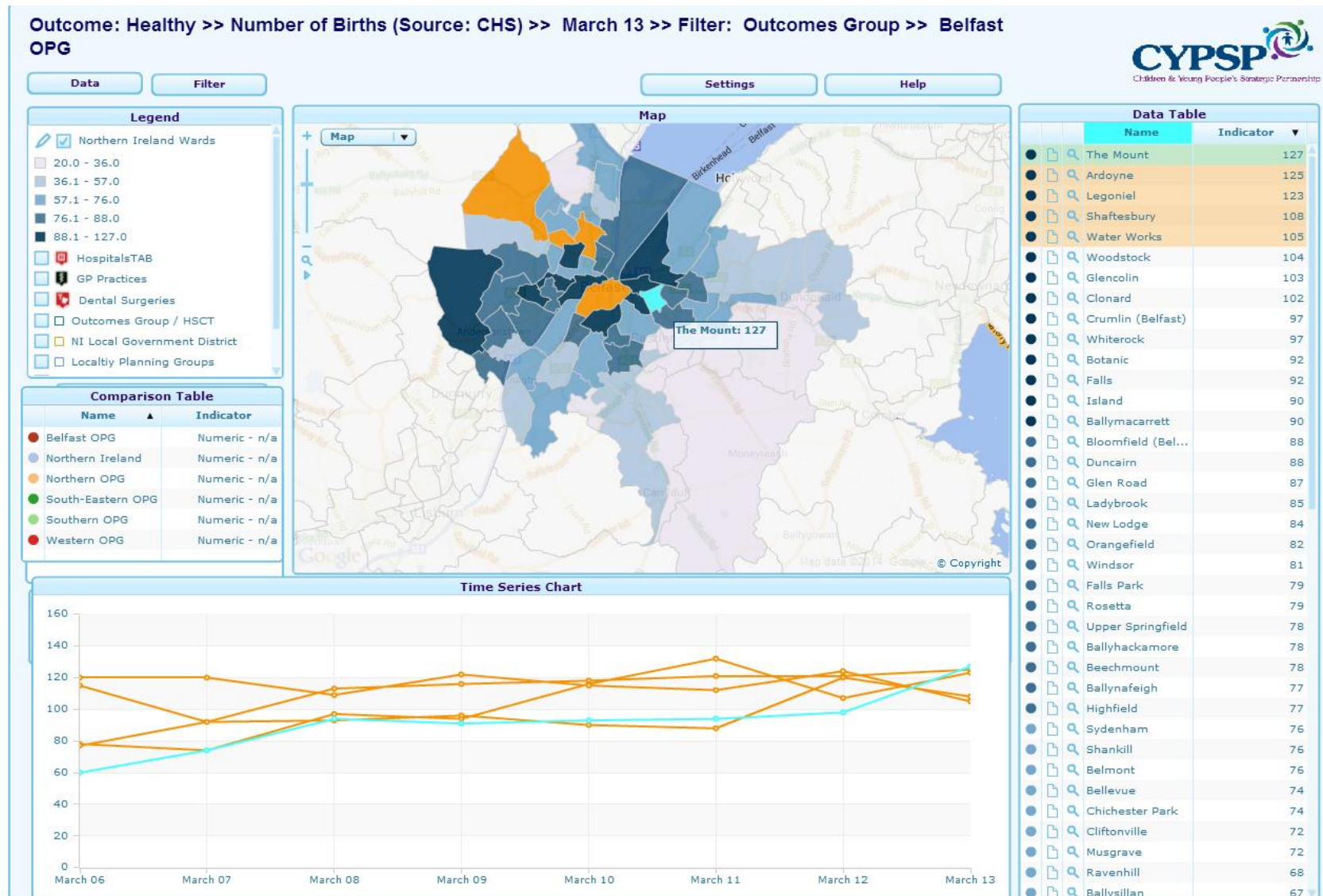

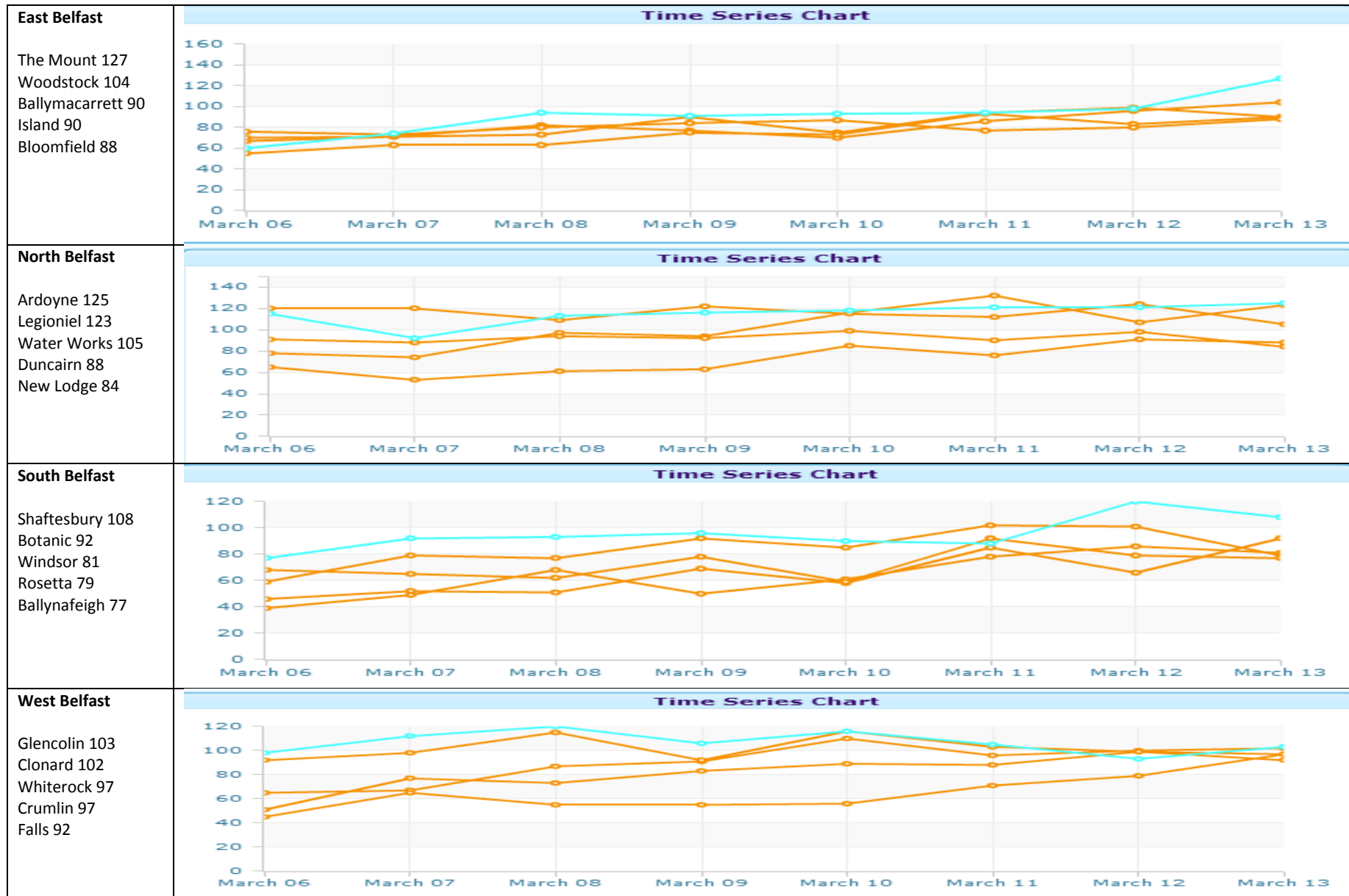

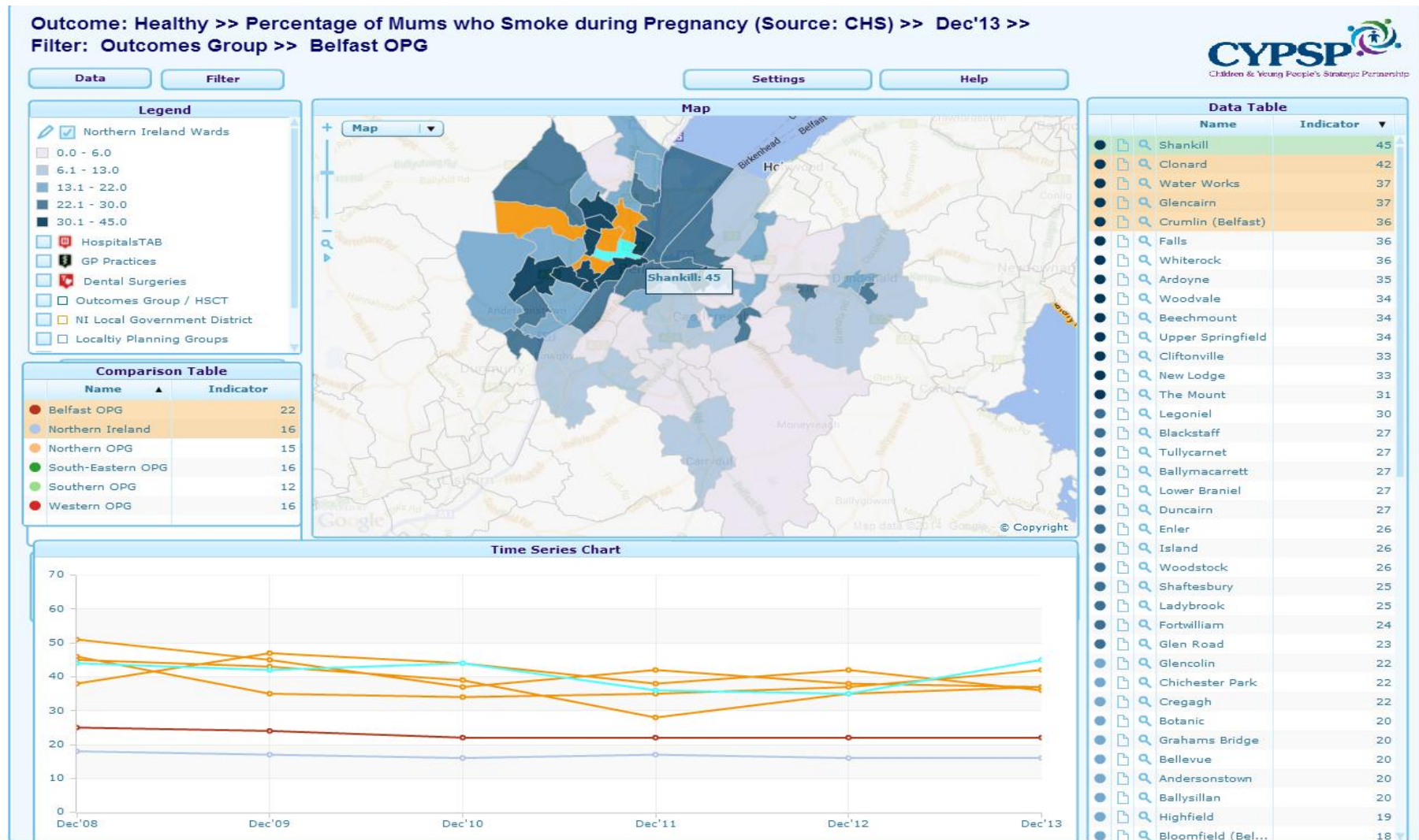

NUMBER OF BIRTHS AT MARCH 13

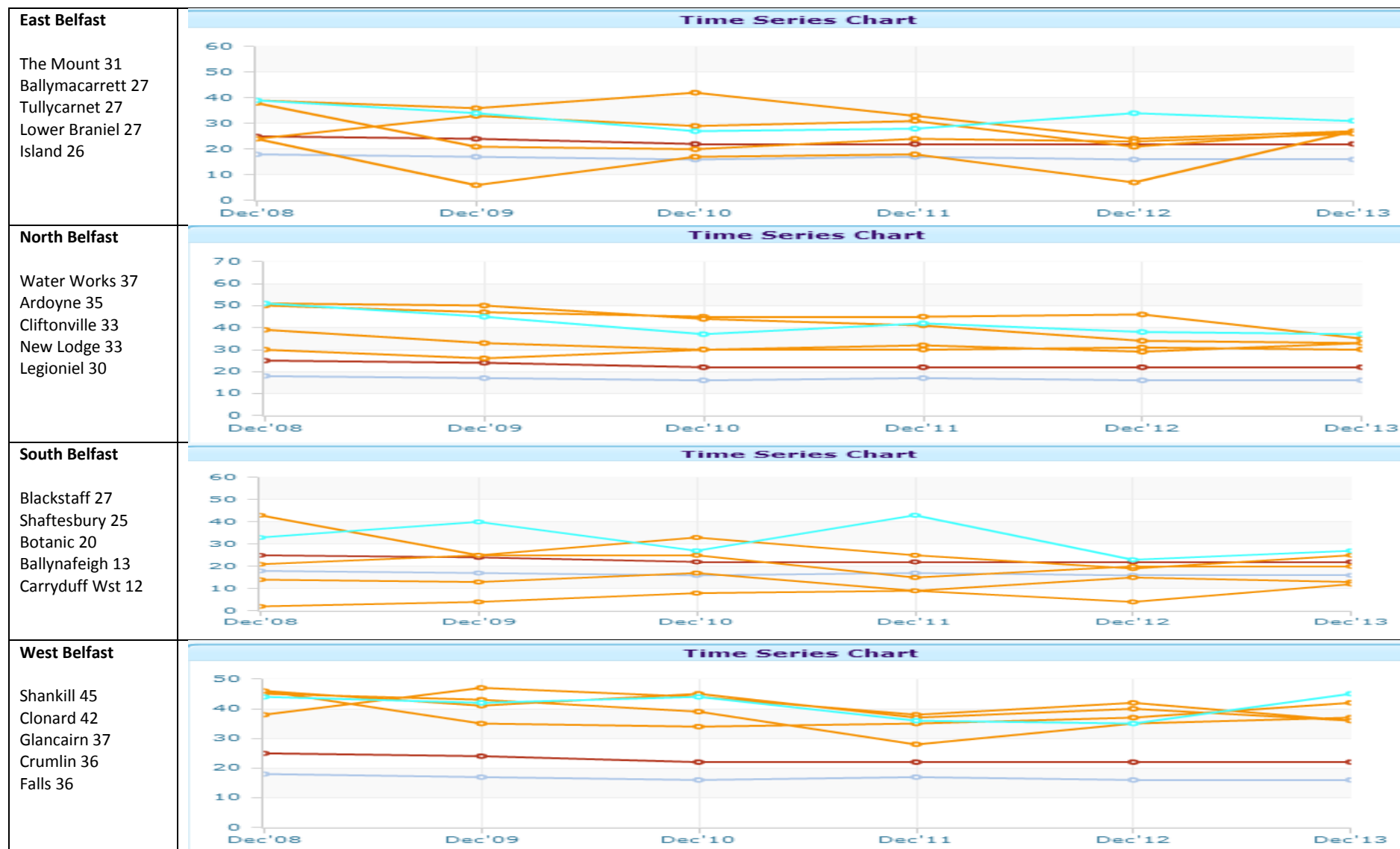

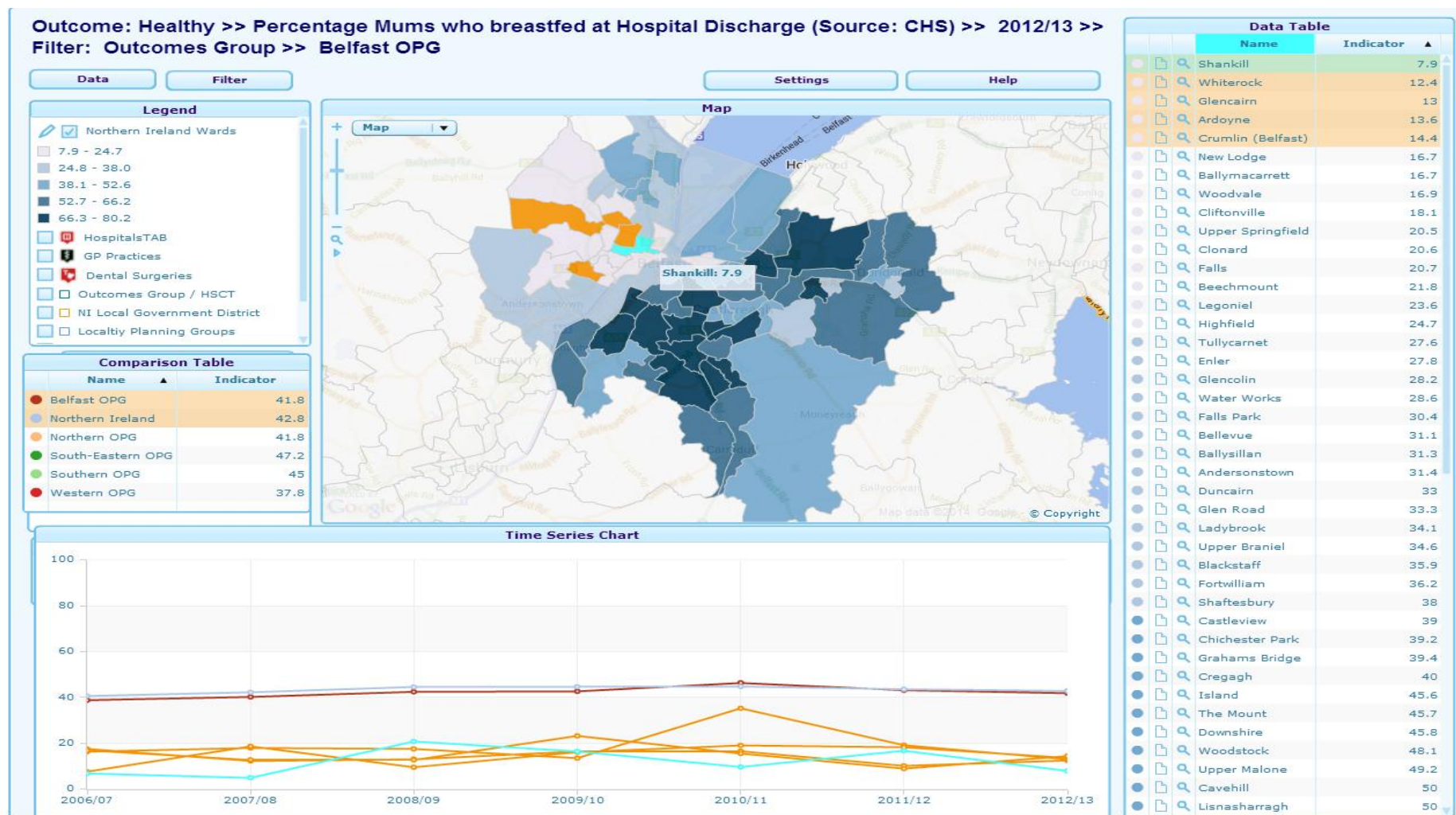

PERCENTAGE MUMS SMOKING DURING PREGNANCY AT DEC 13

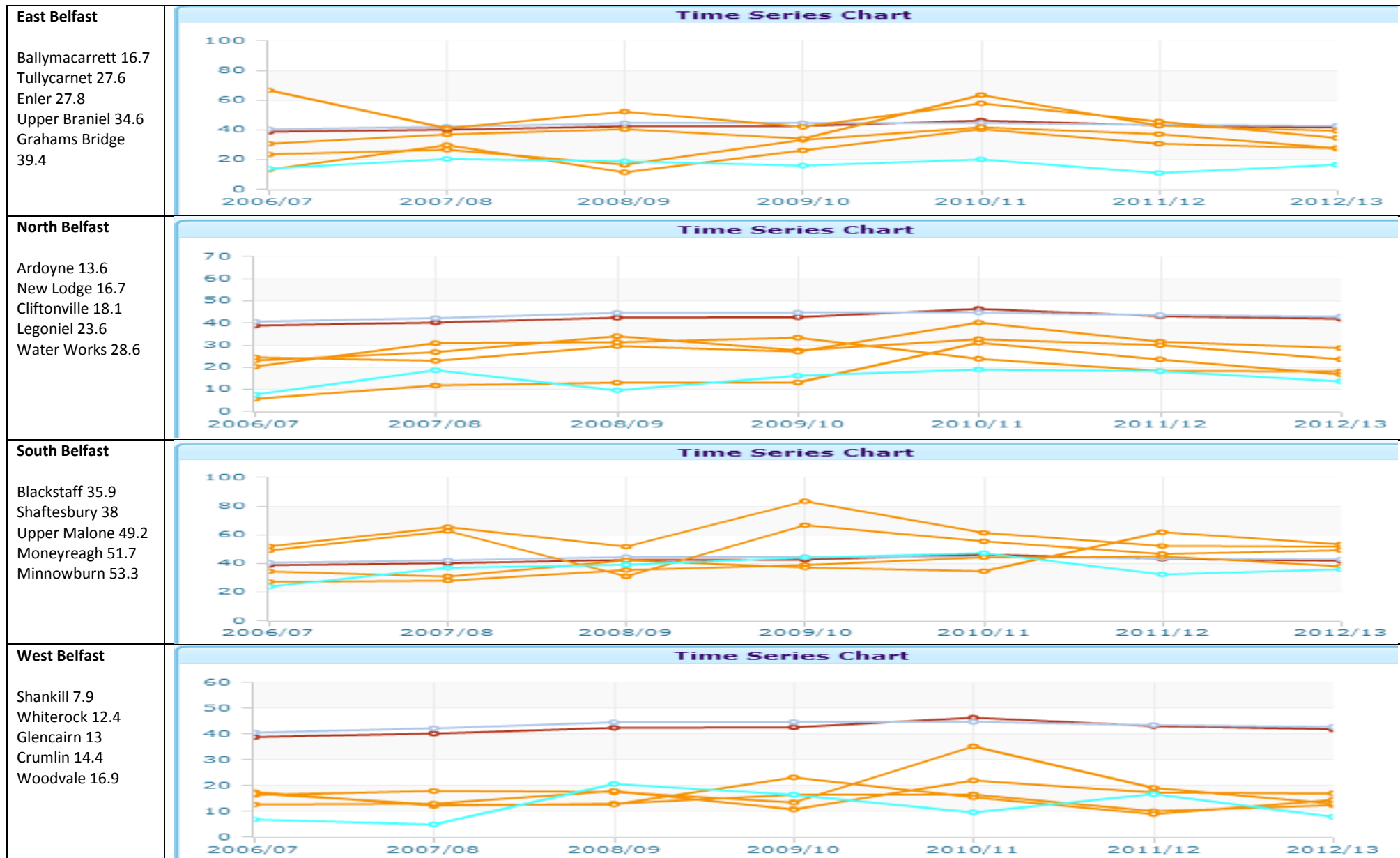

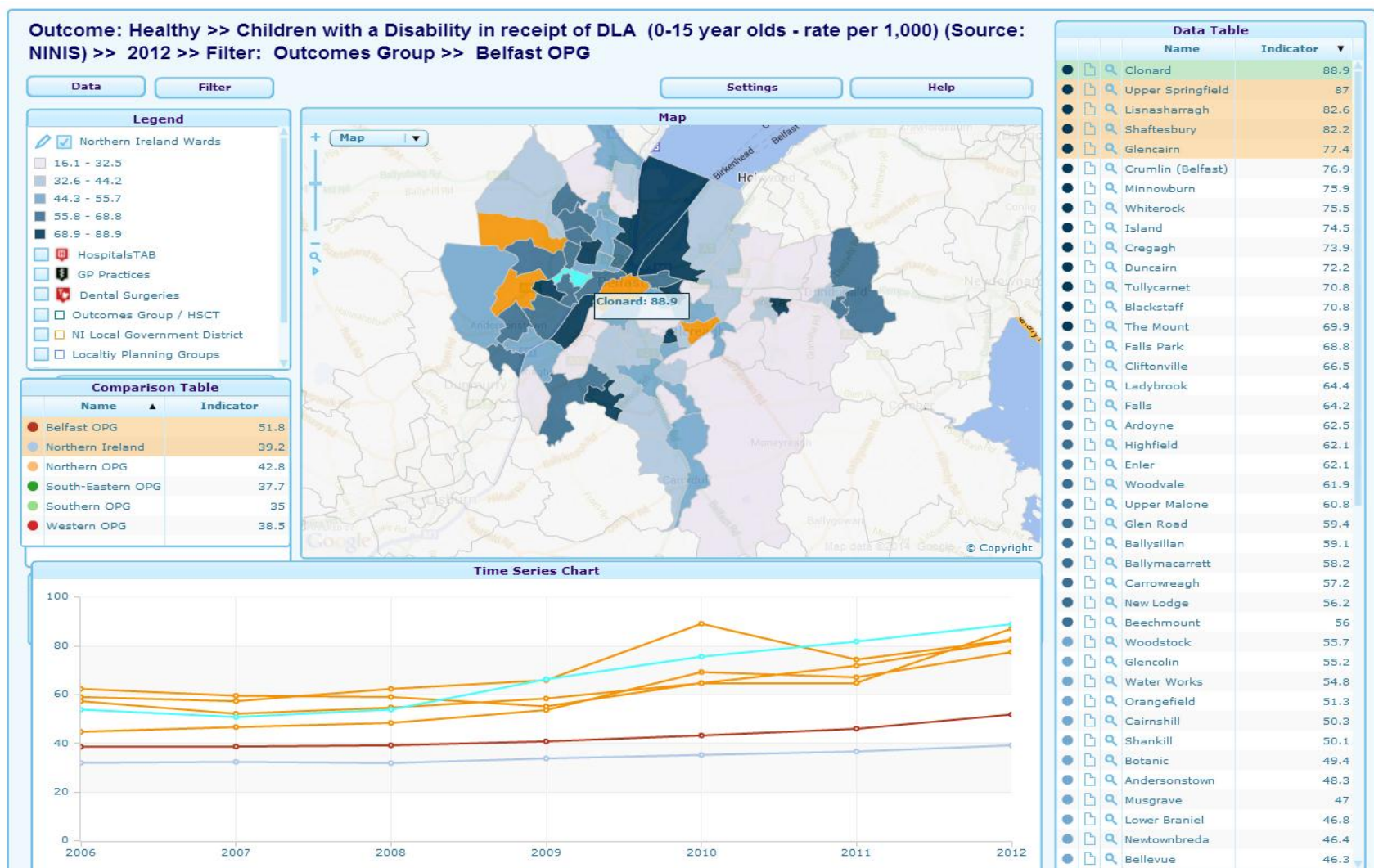

PERCENTAGE MUMS WHO BREASTFED ON DISCHARGE FROM HOSPITAL AT MAR 2013

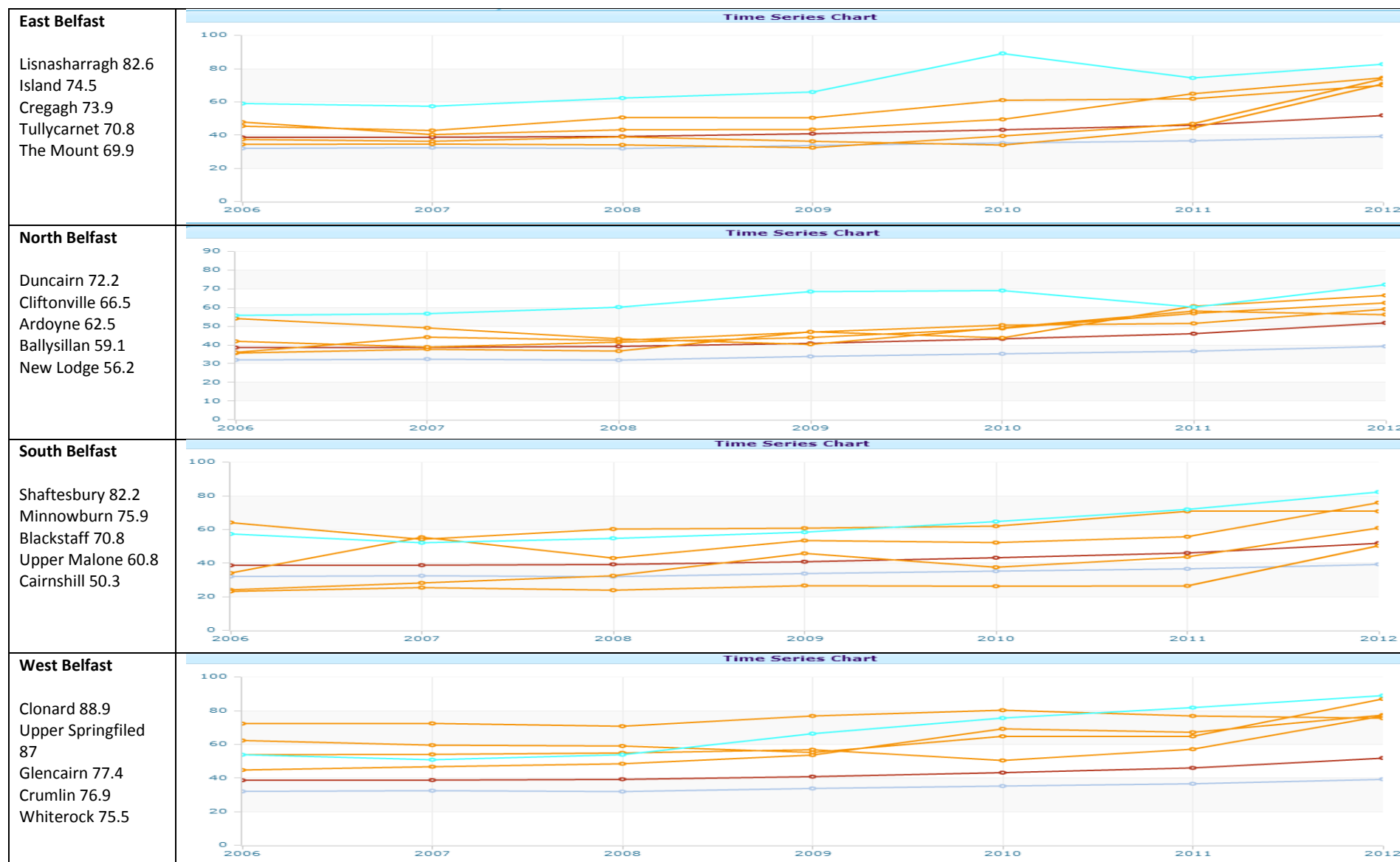

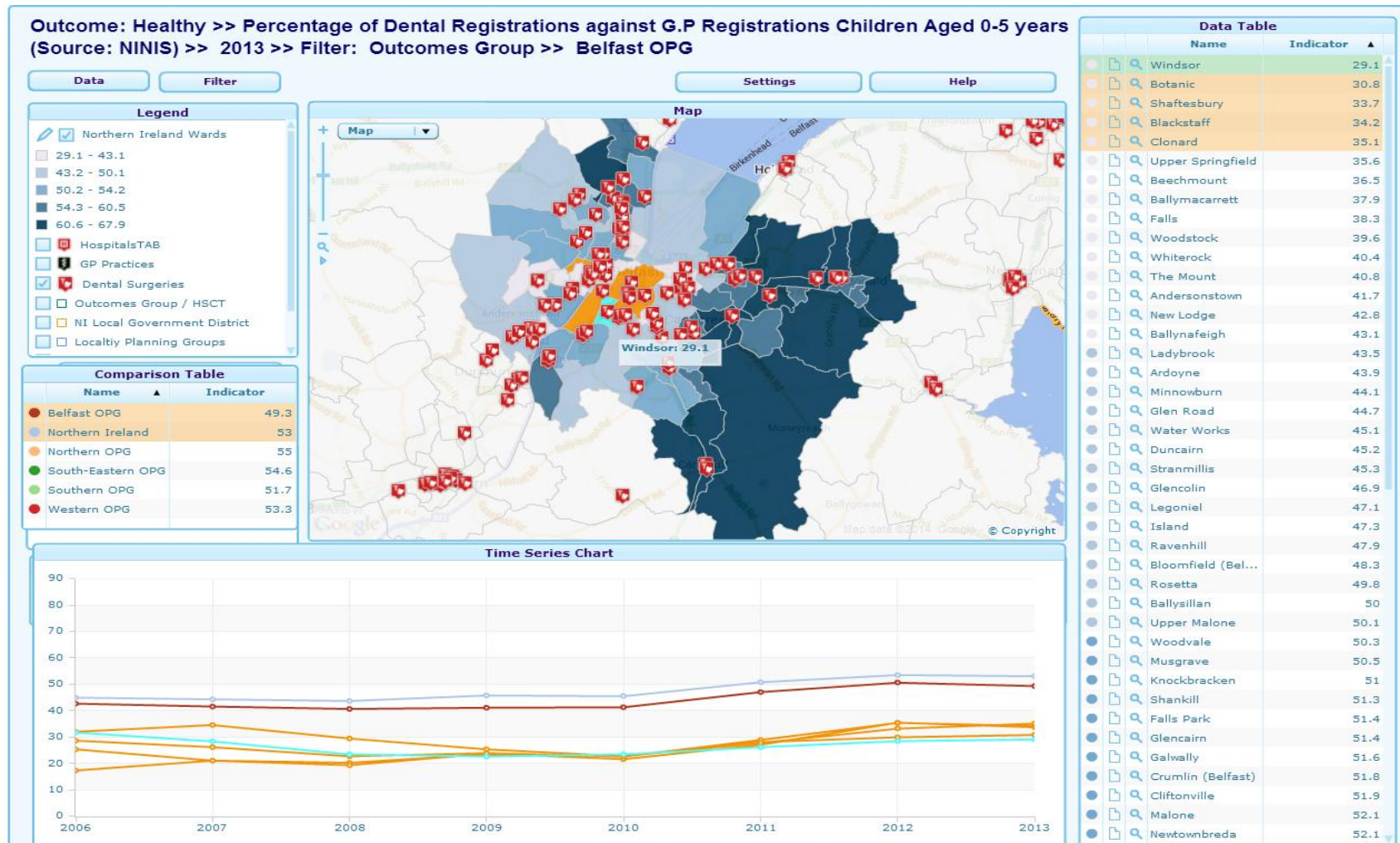


When we look at the rate of children aged between 0 – 15 years who are in receipt of DLA the majority of Belfast wards are sitting above the Northern Ireland average of 39.2 (pale blue line). The top 5 wards are highlighted above with Clonard having a rate of 88.9 which would equate to 9% of its 0-15 population with Lisnasharragh peaking in 2010 at 89.1. *Note: Trend lines should be read in conjunction with the data table.*

RATE PER 1000 CHILDREN AGED 0-15 YEARS IN RECEIPT OF DLA DEC 2012

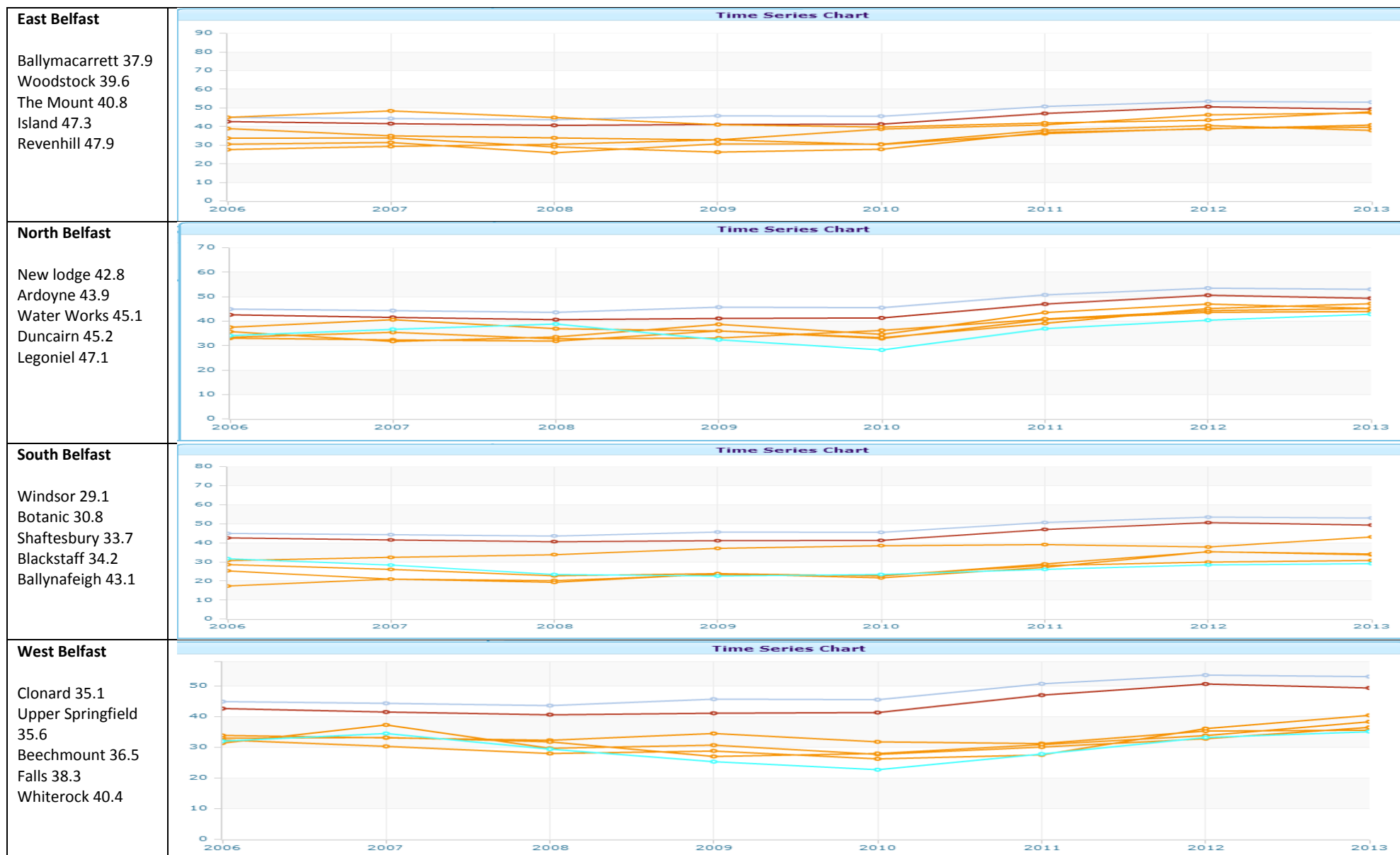

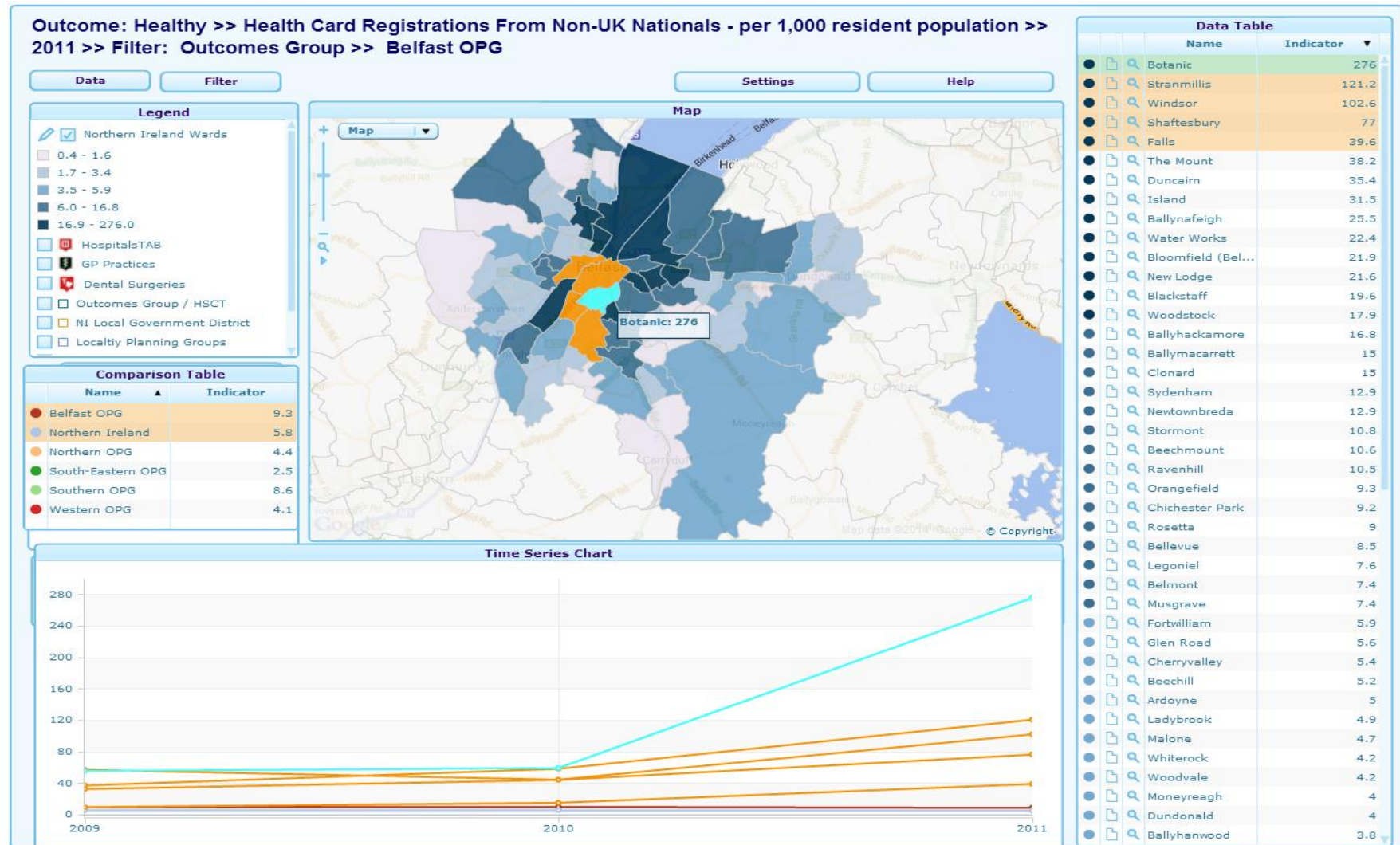


The worst 5 wards are highlighted here for percentage of children aged 0 – 5 who are registered with a Dentist with Windsor being worst with 29.1%. The data table shows in ascending order all other wards that are sitting below the Belfast Outcomes Group average which is depicted in dark red on the Time Series. The Northern Ireland average is the pale blue line. The map also shows the location of all Dental Practices across the area. It is interesting to note the higher registrations are in areas where there are fewer practices. *Note: Trend lines should be read in conjunction with the data table i.e. lowest as highlighted.*

PERCENTAGE DENTAL REGISTRATIONS CHILDREN AGED 0 – 5 YEARS AT DEC 2013

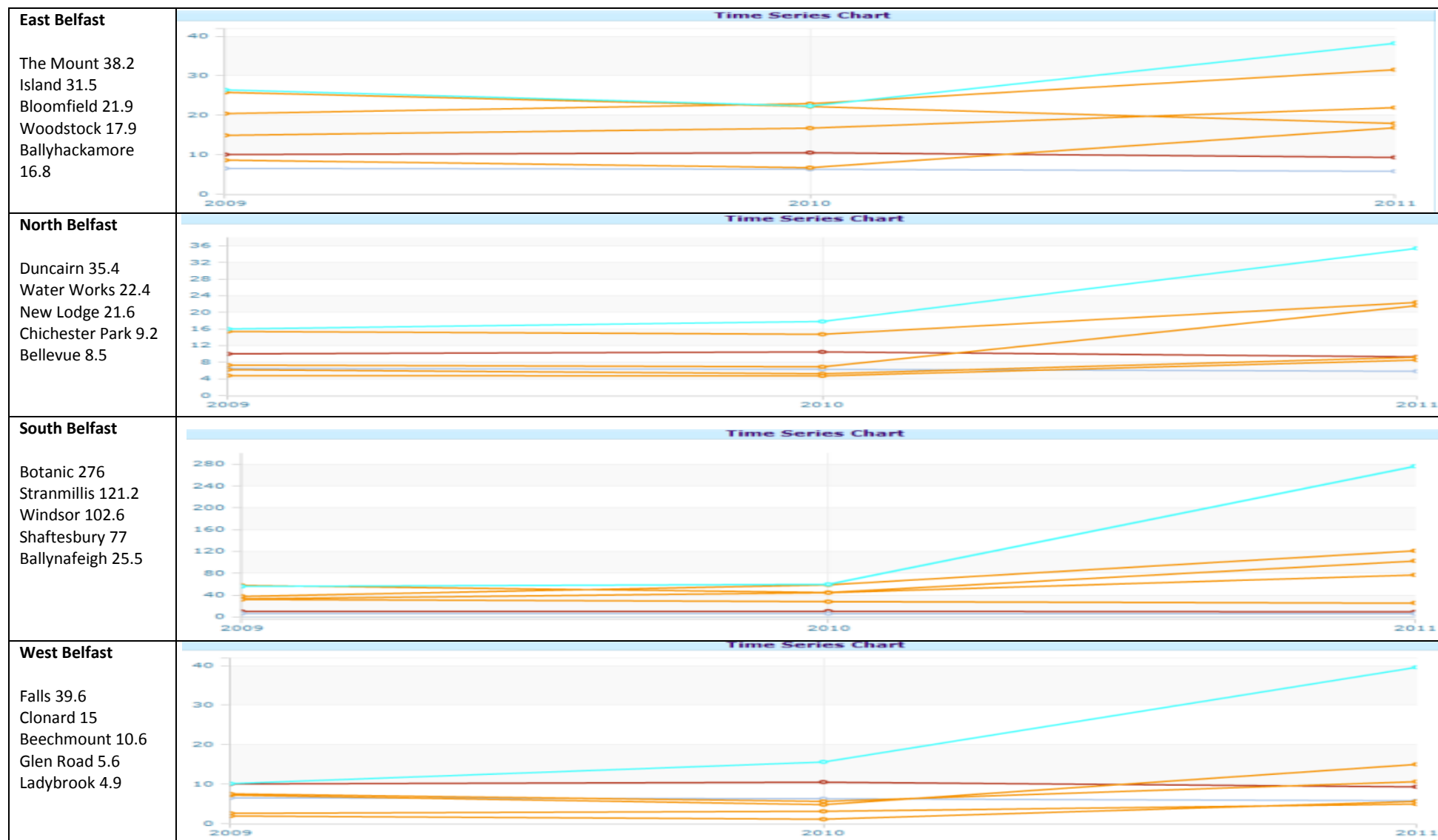

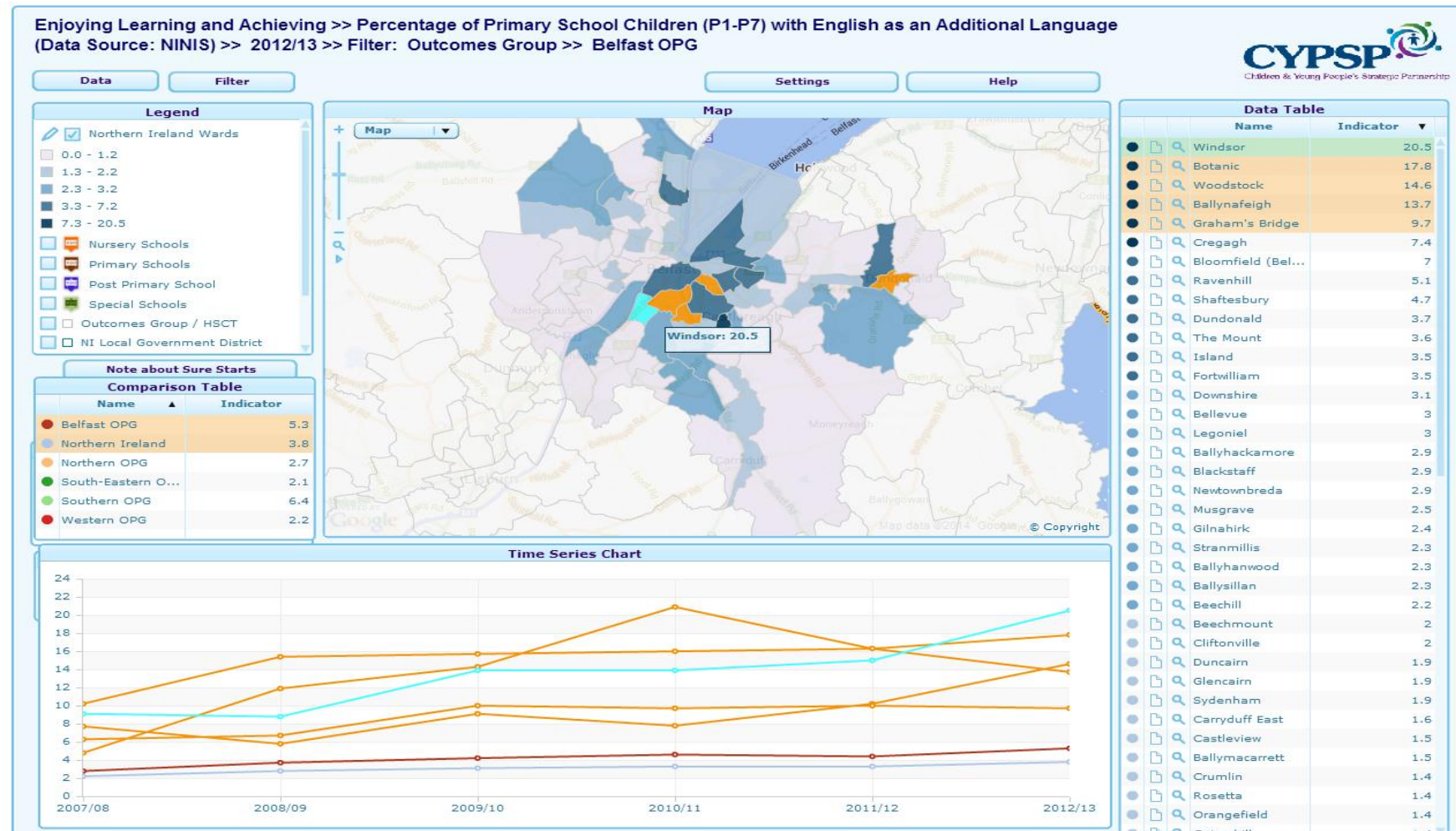


When we look at the rate of health card registrations for non-UK nationals the majority within Belfast are in and around the city centre. RATE PER 1000 HEALTH CARD REGISTRATIONS FROM NON UK NATIONALS DEC 2011

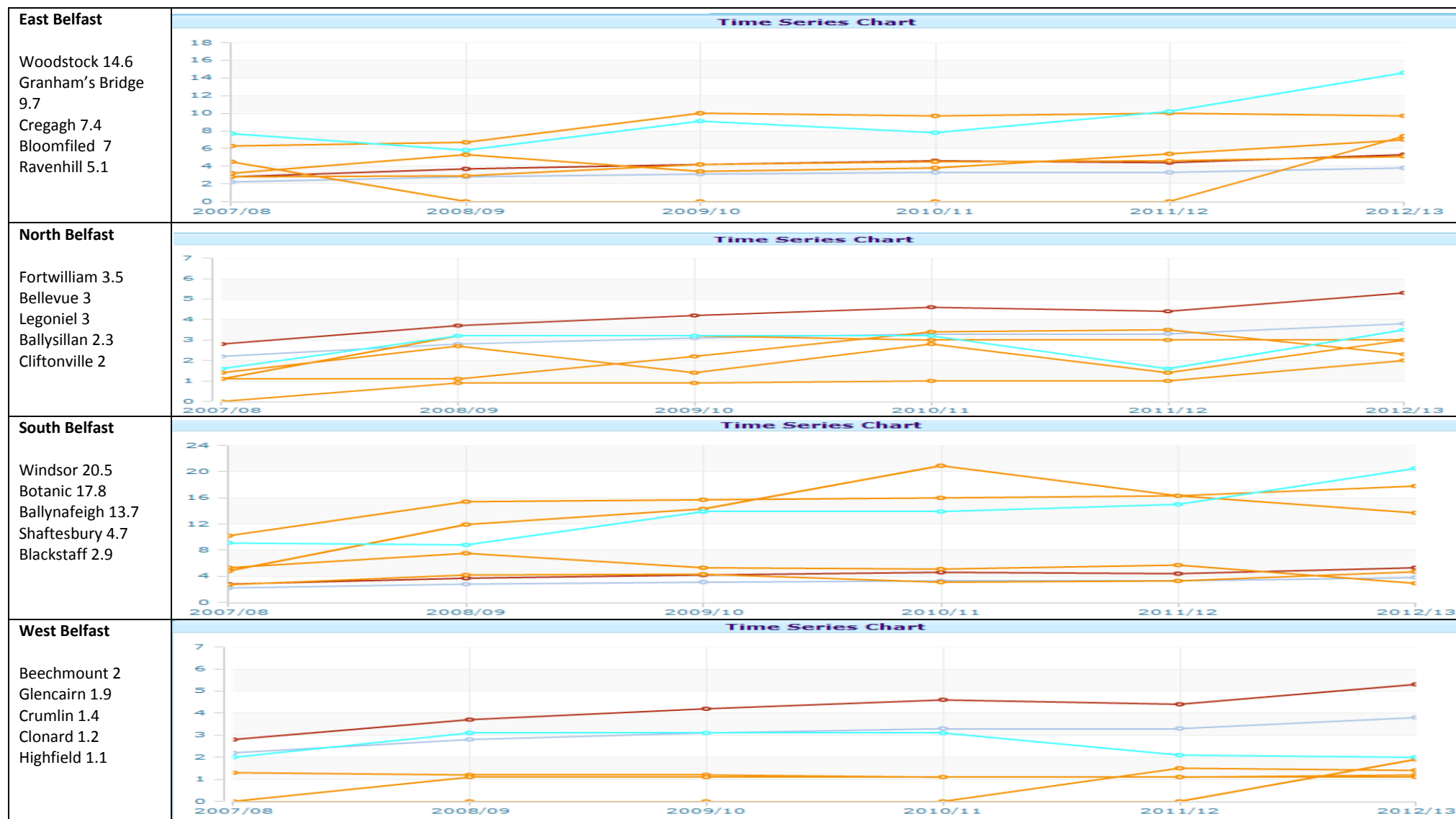

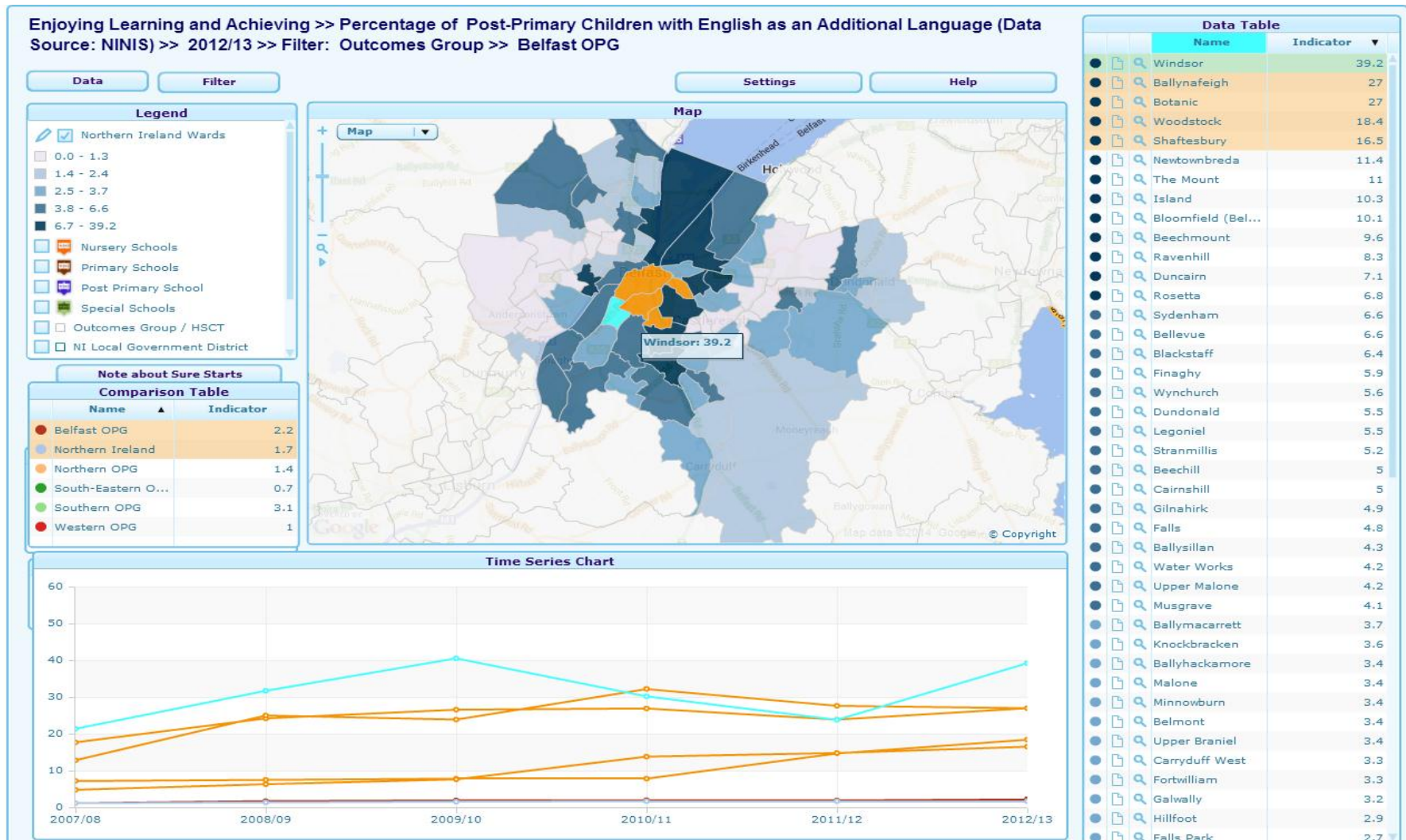

PERCENTAGE PRIMARY SCHOOL CHILDREN WITH ENGLISH AS ADDITIONAL LANGUAGE JUNE 2013

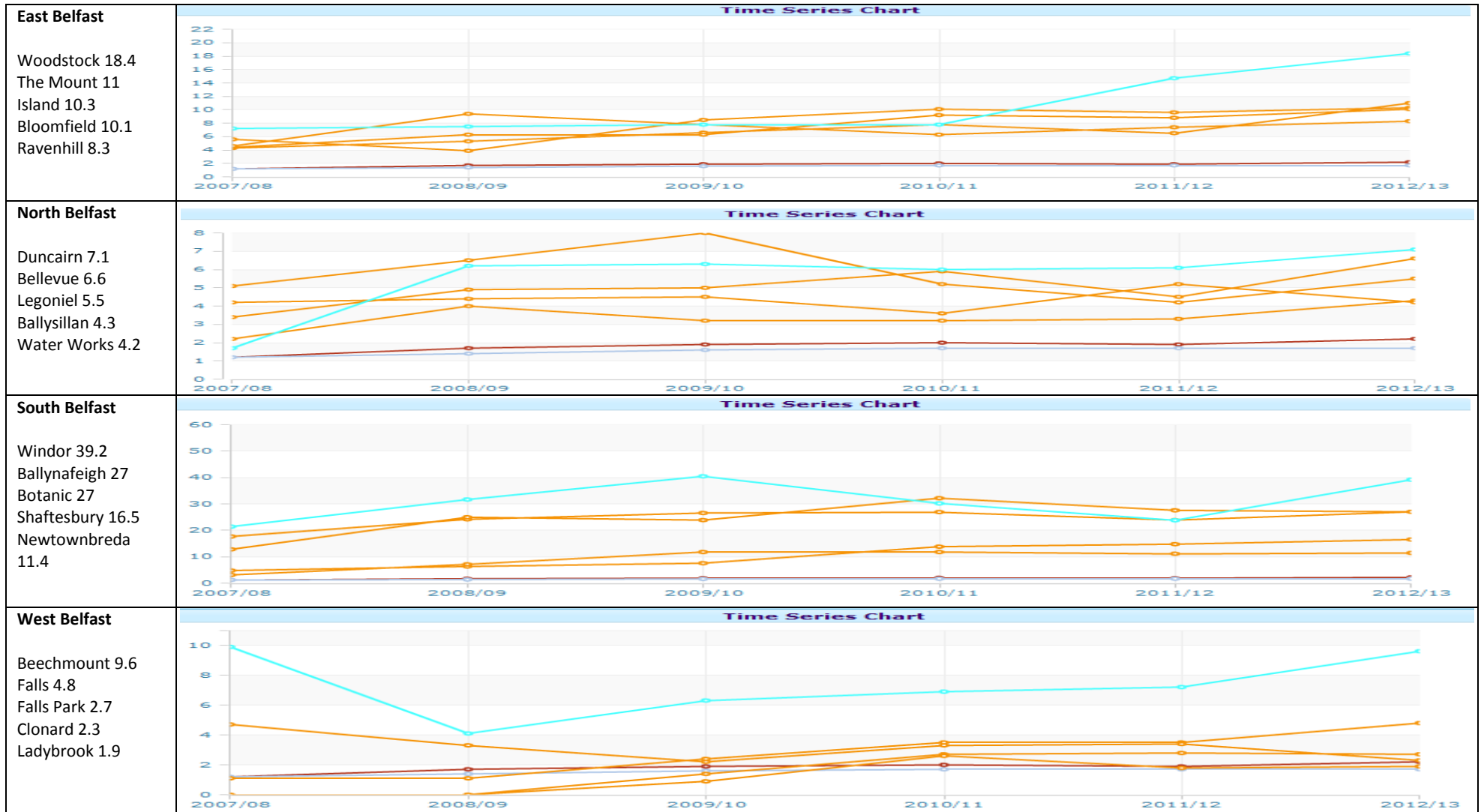

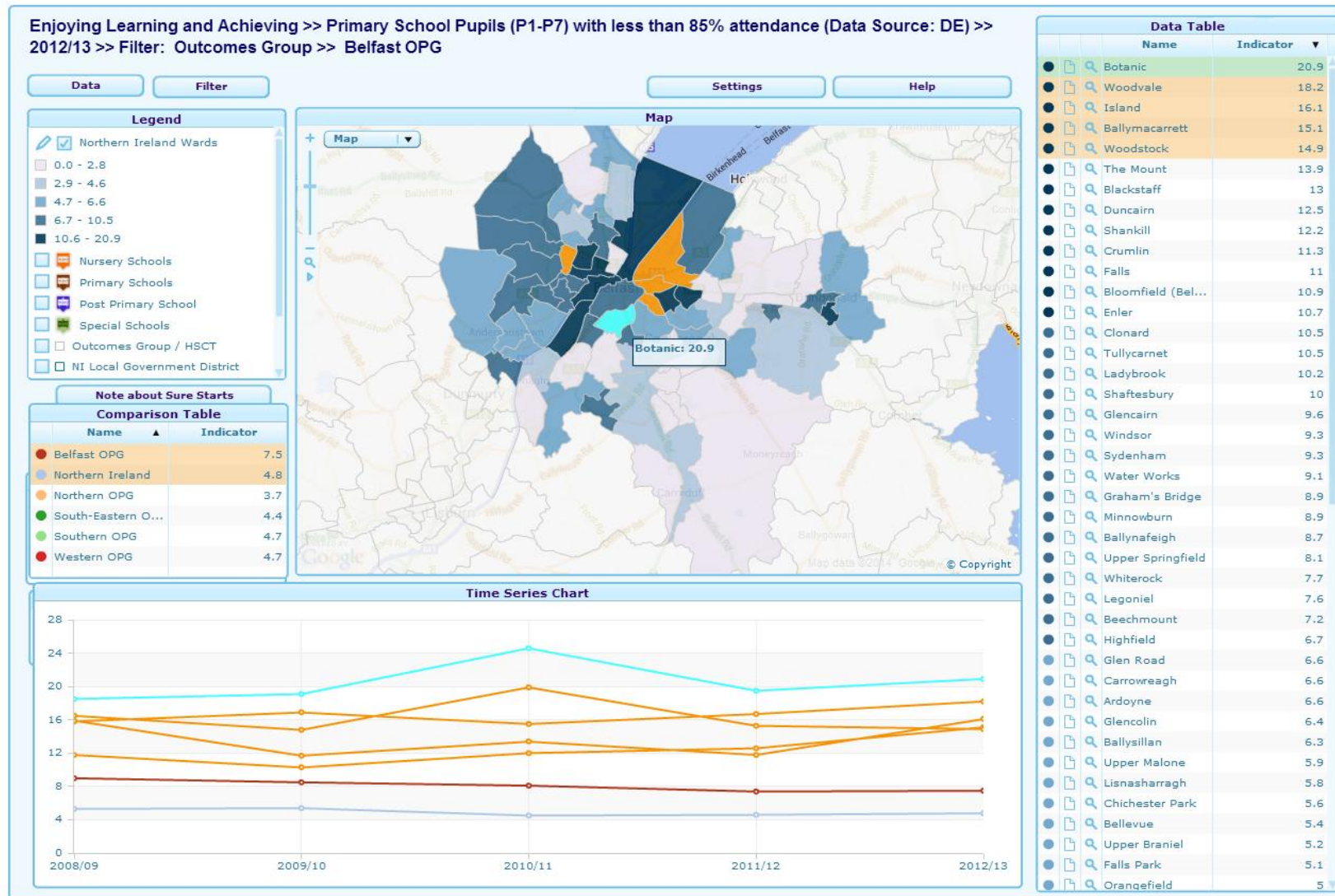

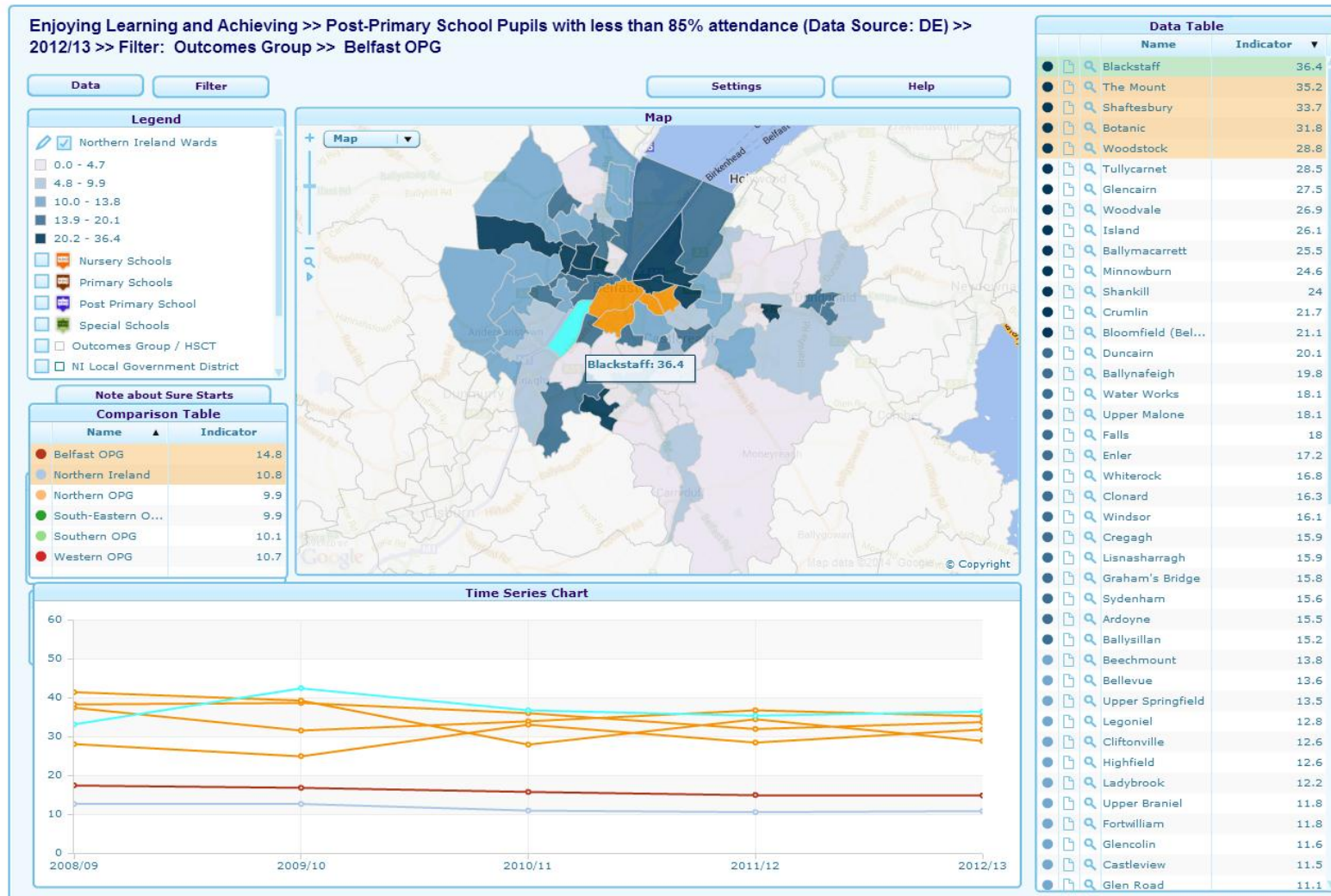

PERCENTAGE PRIMARY SCHOOL CHILDREN WITH LESS THAN 85% ATTENDANCE AT JUNE 2013

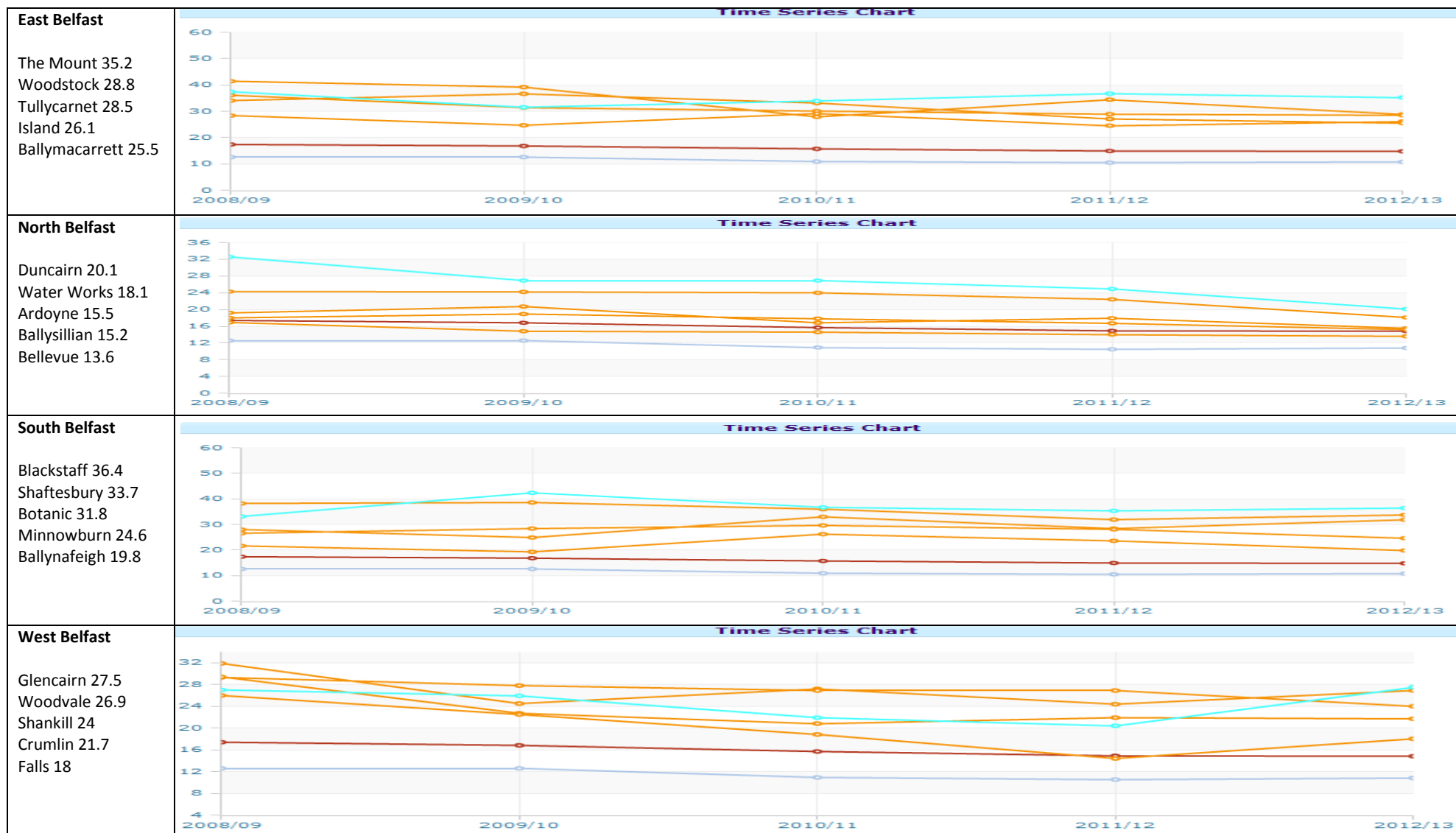

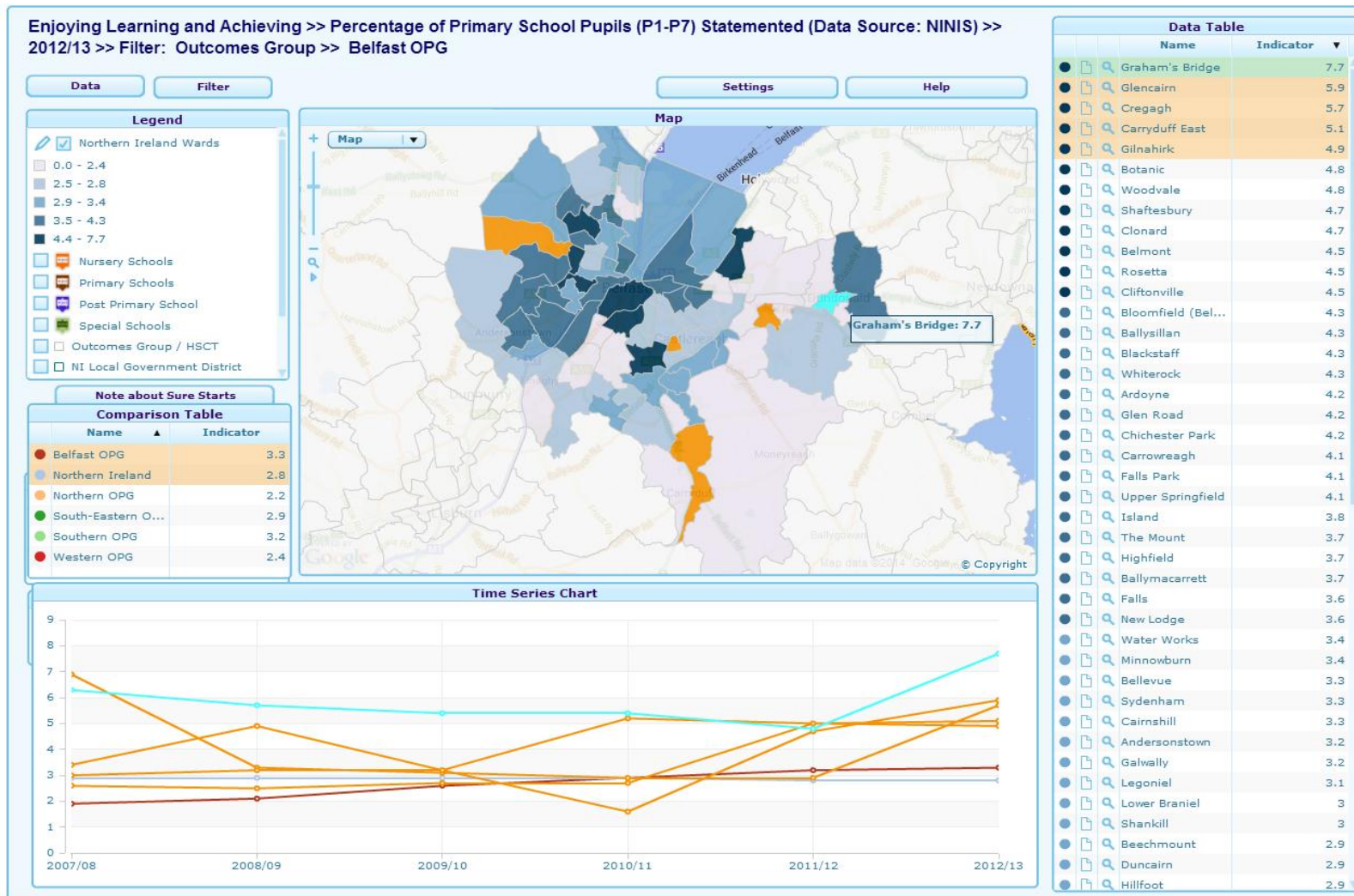

PERCENTAGE POST –PRIMARY SCHOOL CHILDREN LESS THAN 85% ATTENDANCE AT JUNE 2013

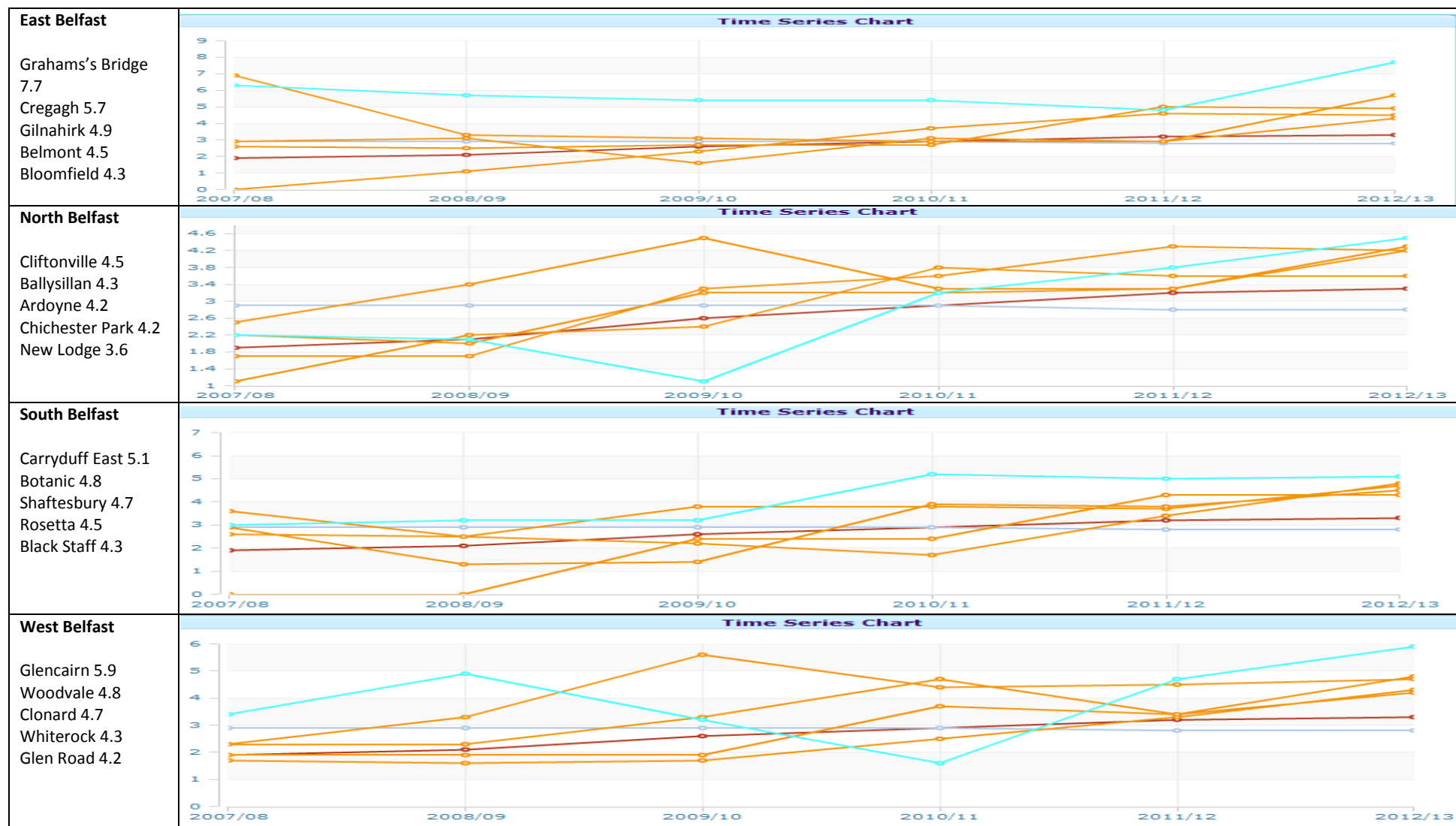

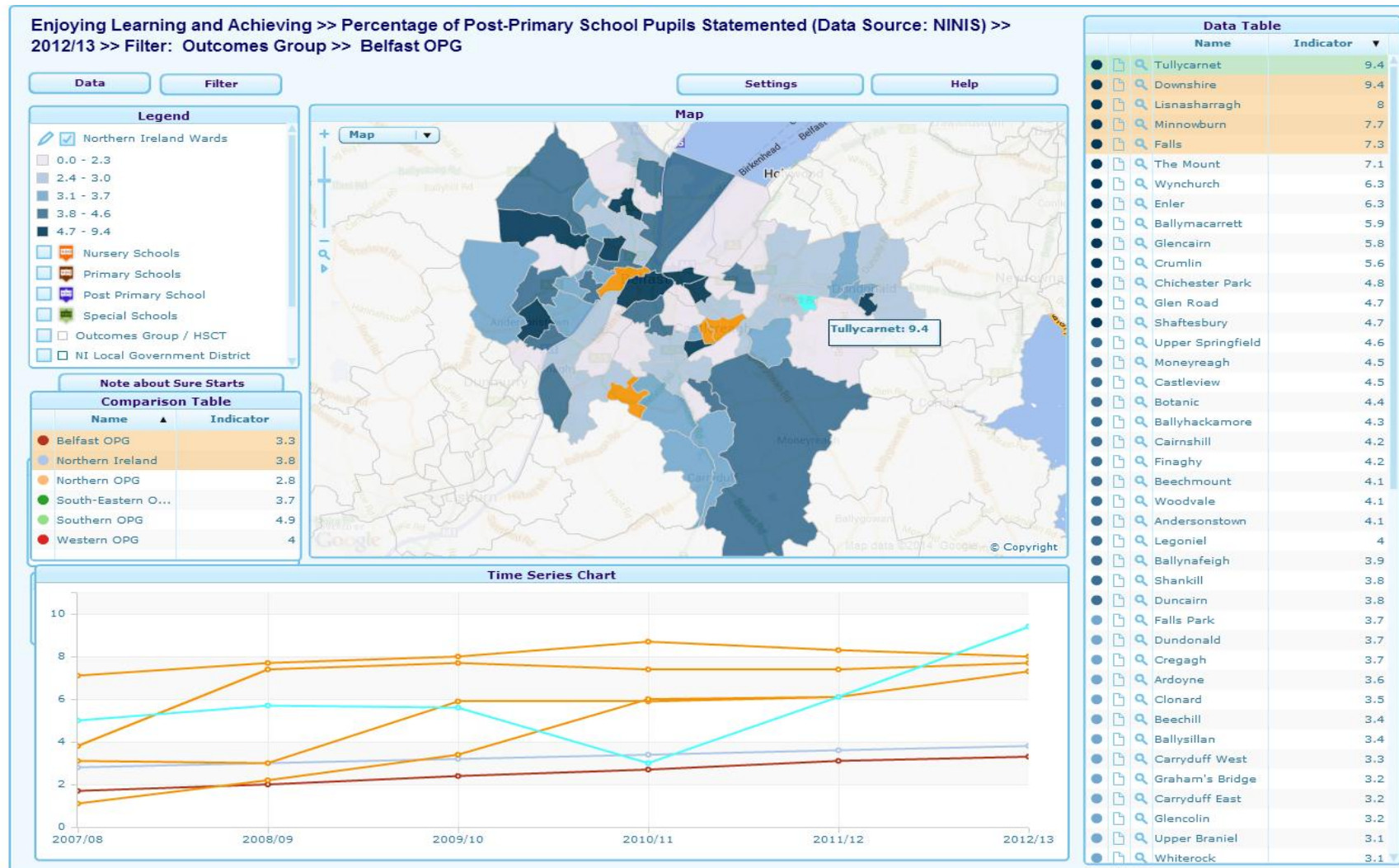

PERCENTAGE PRIMARY SCHOOL PUPILS STATEMENTED AT JUNE 2013

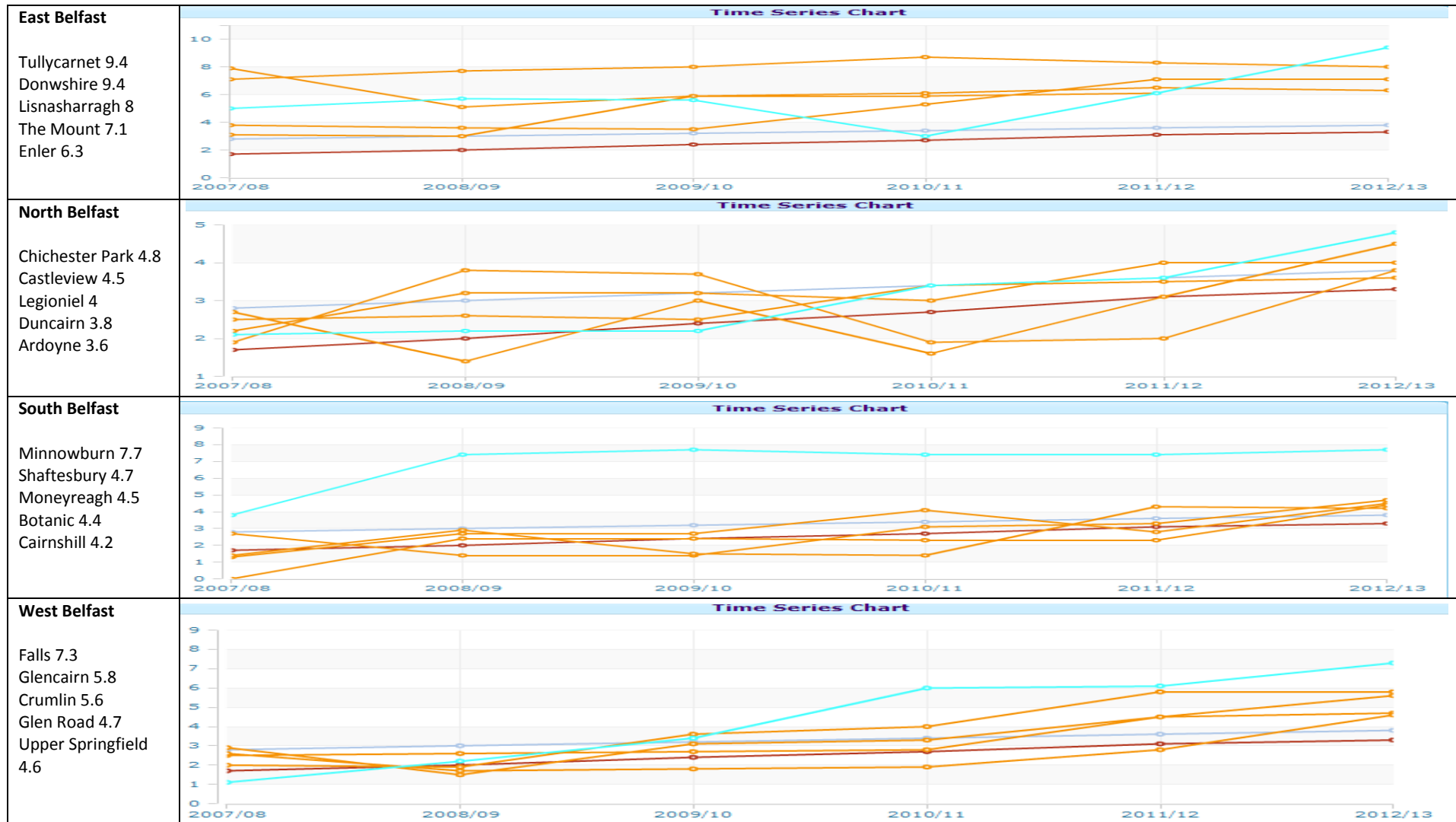

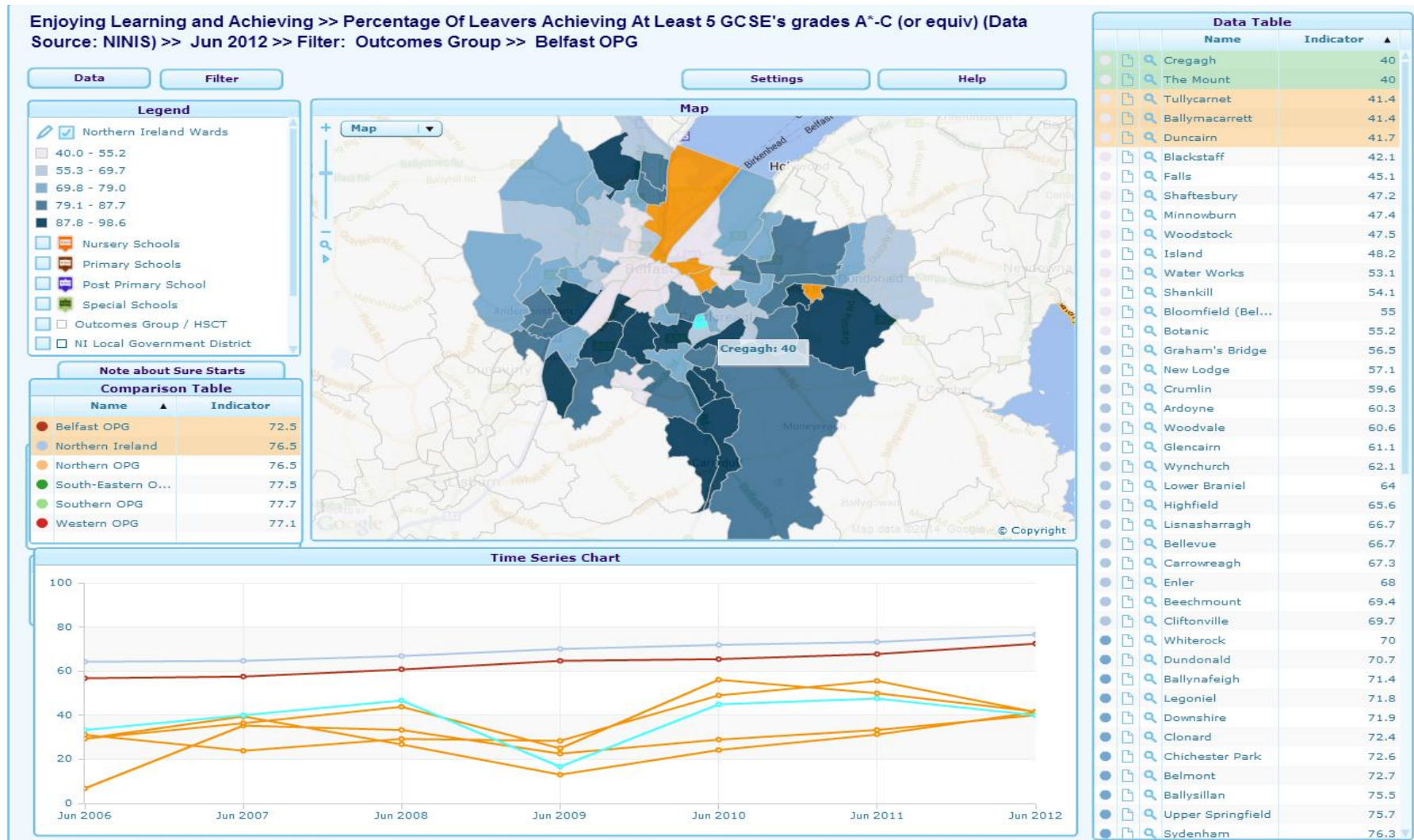

PERCENTAGE POST-PRIMARY SCHOOL PUPILS STATEMENTED AT JUNE 2013

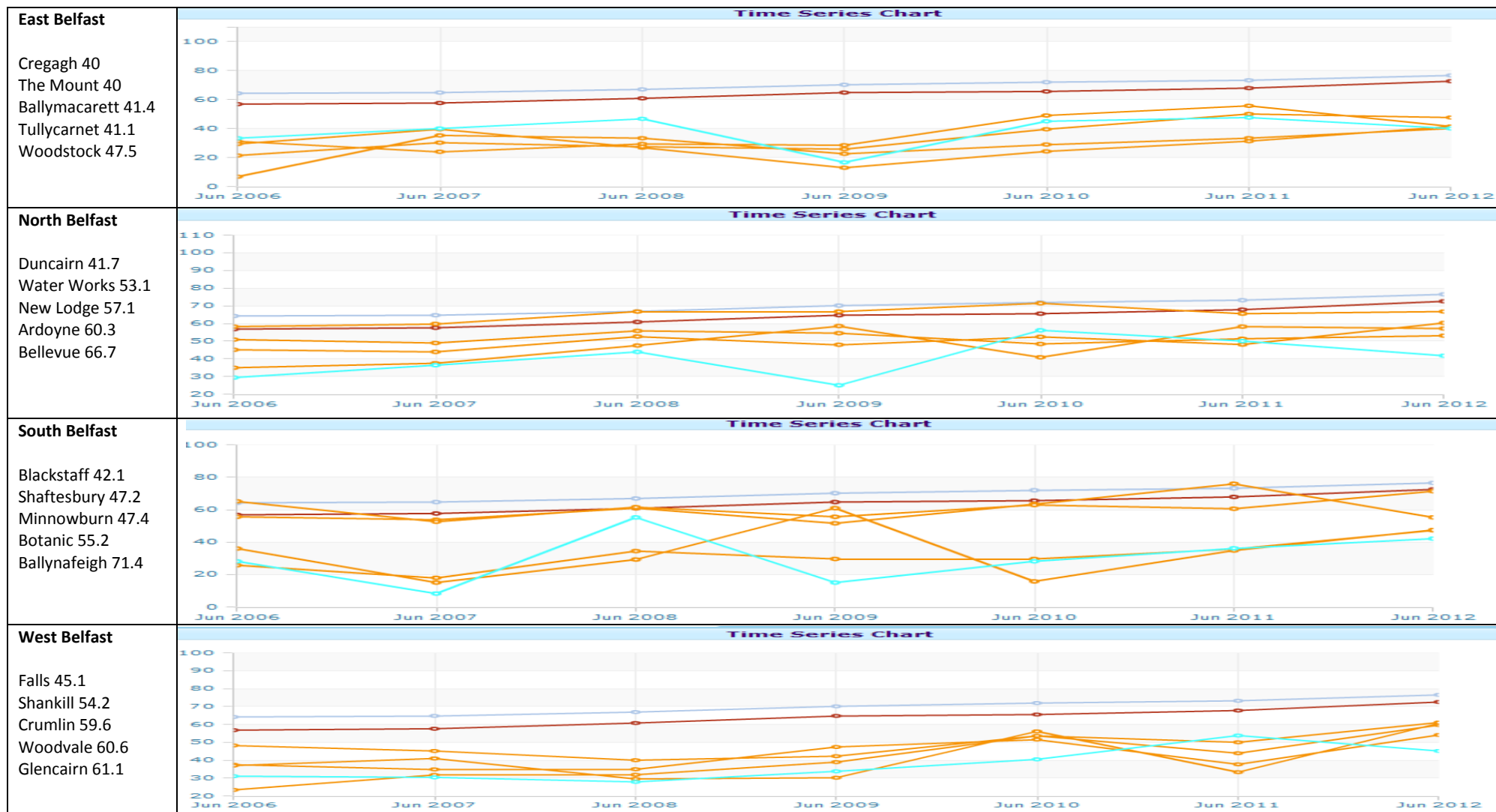

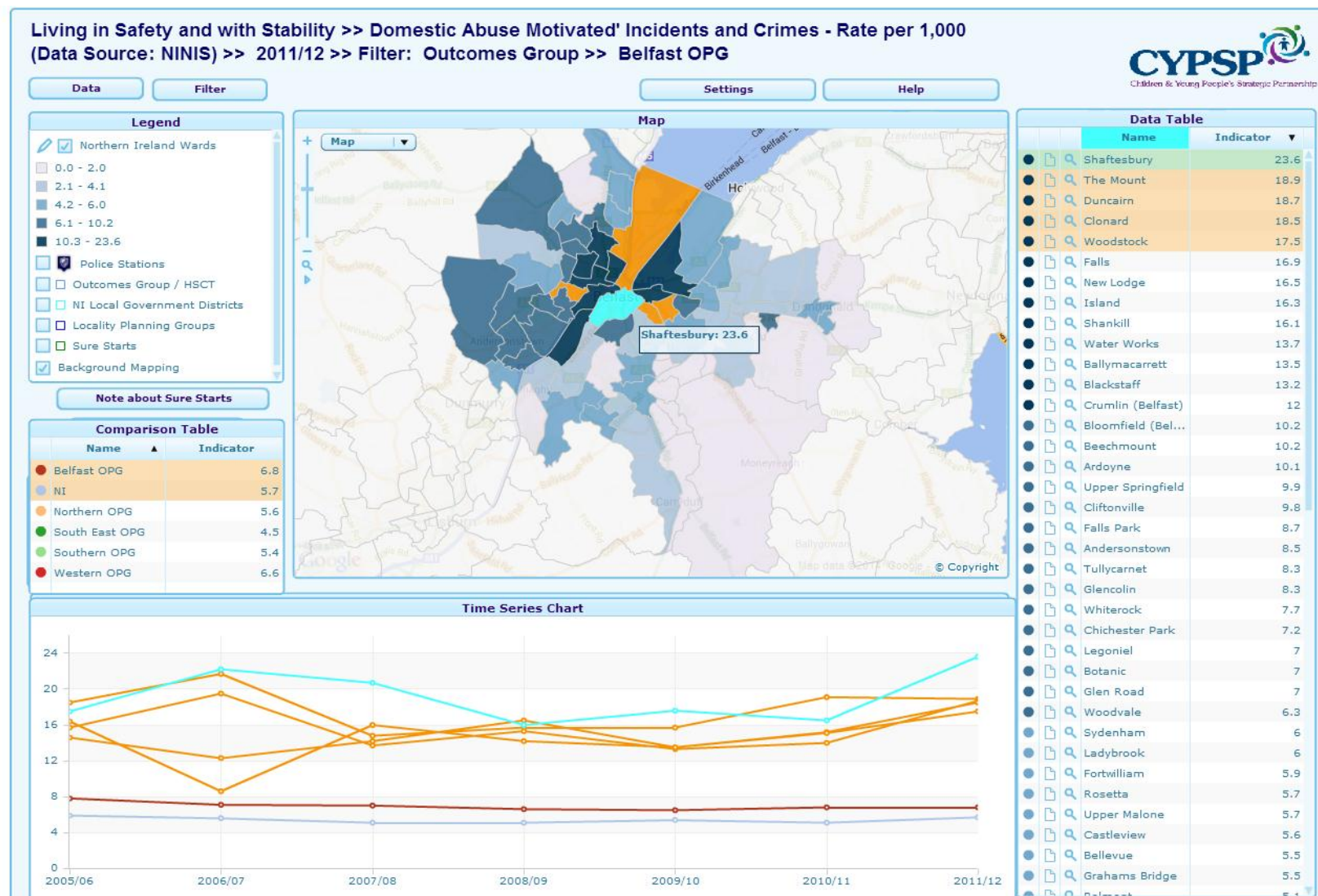

PERCENTAGE LEAVERS ACHIEVING 5 GCSES A*-C (OR EQUIV) JUNE 2012

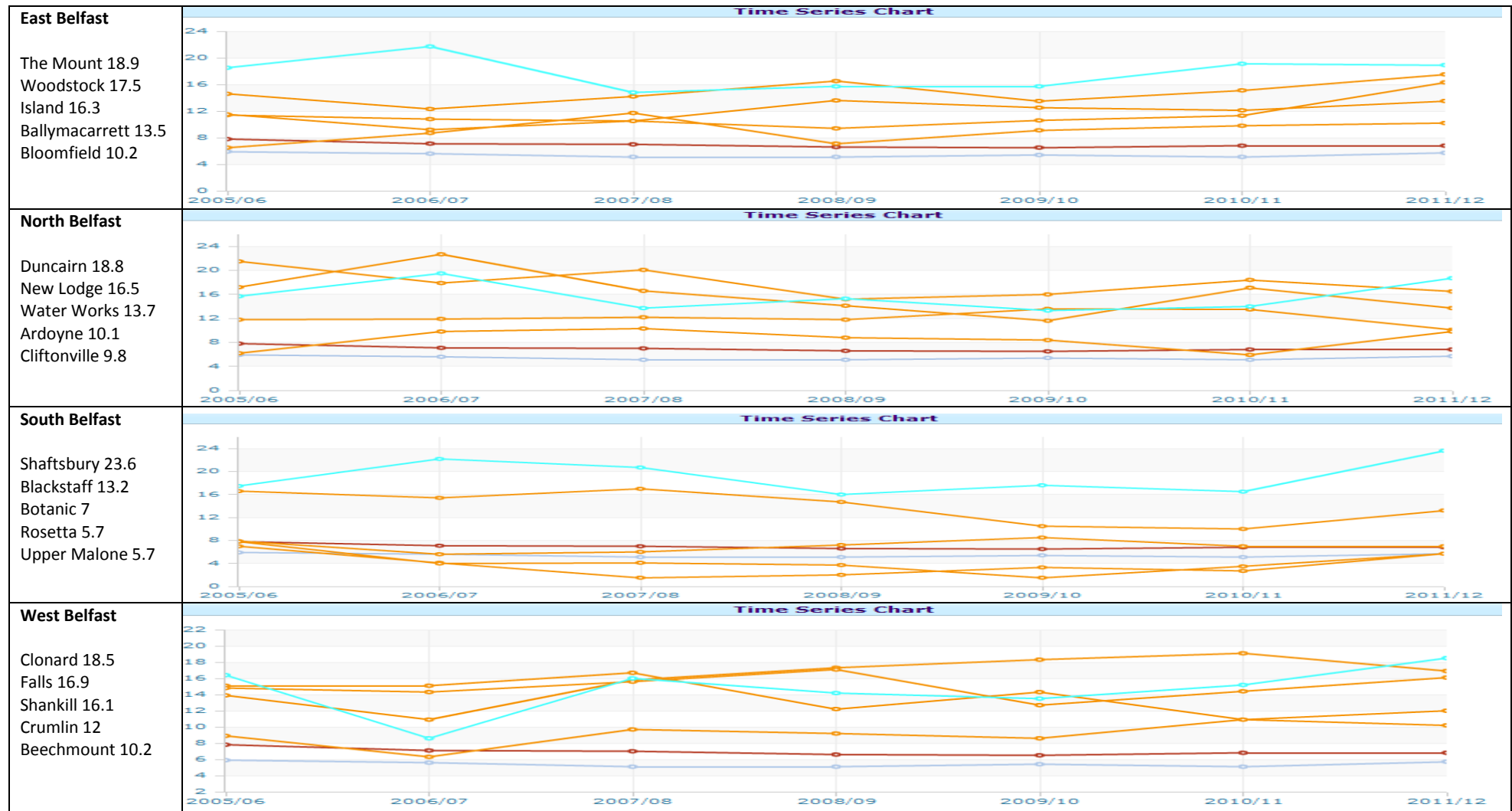

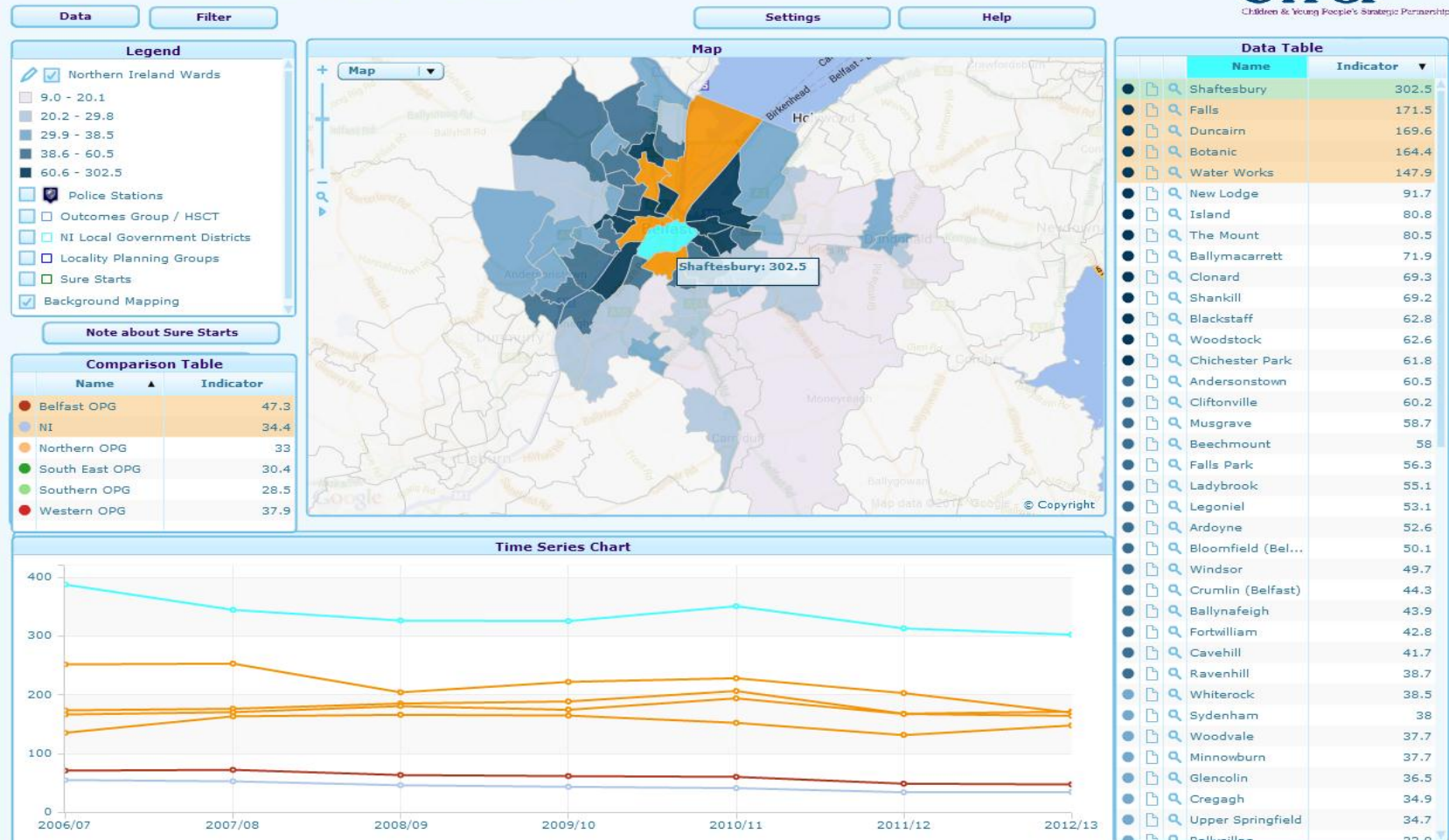

RATE PER 1000 DOMESTIC ABUSE INCIDENTS AND CRIMES MAR 12



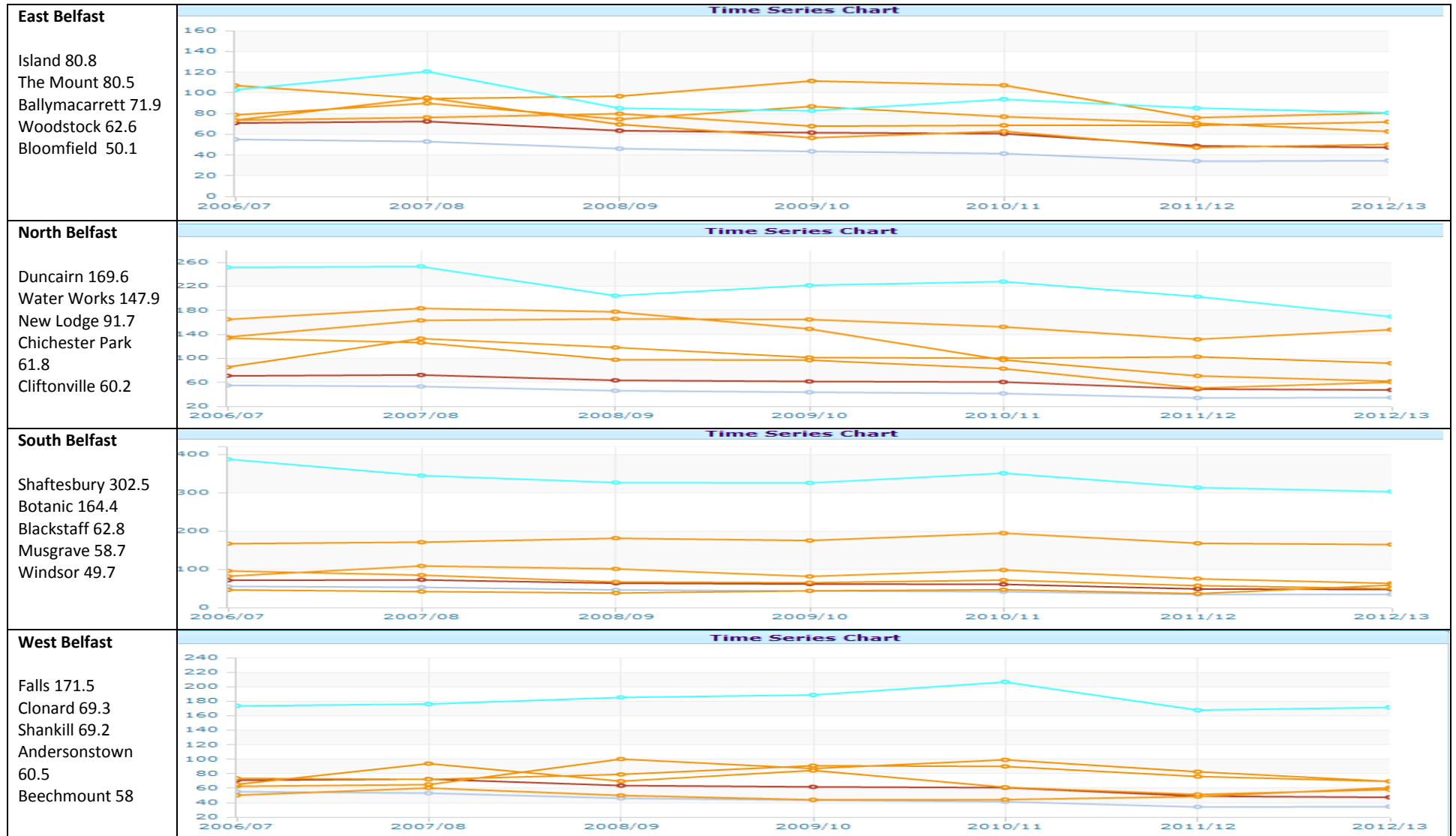

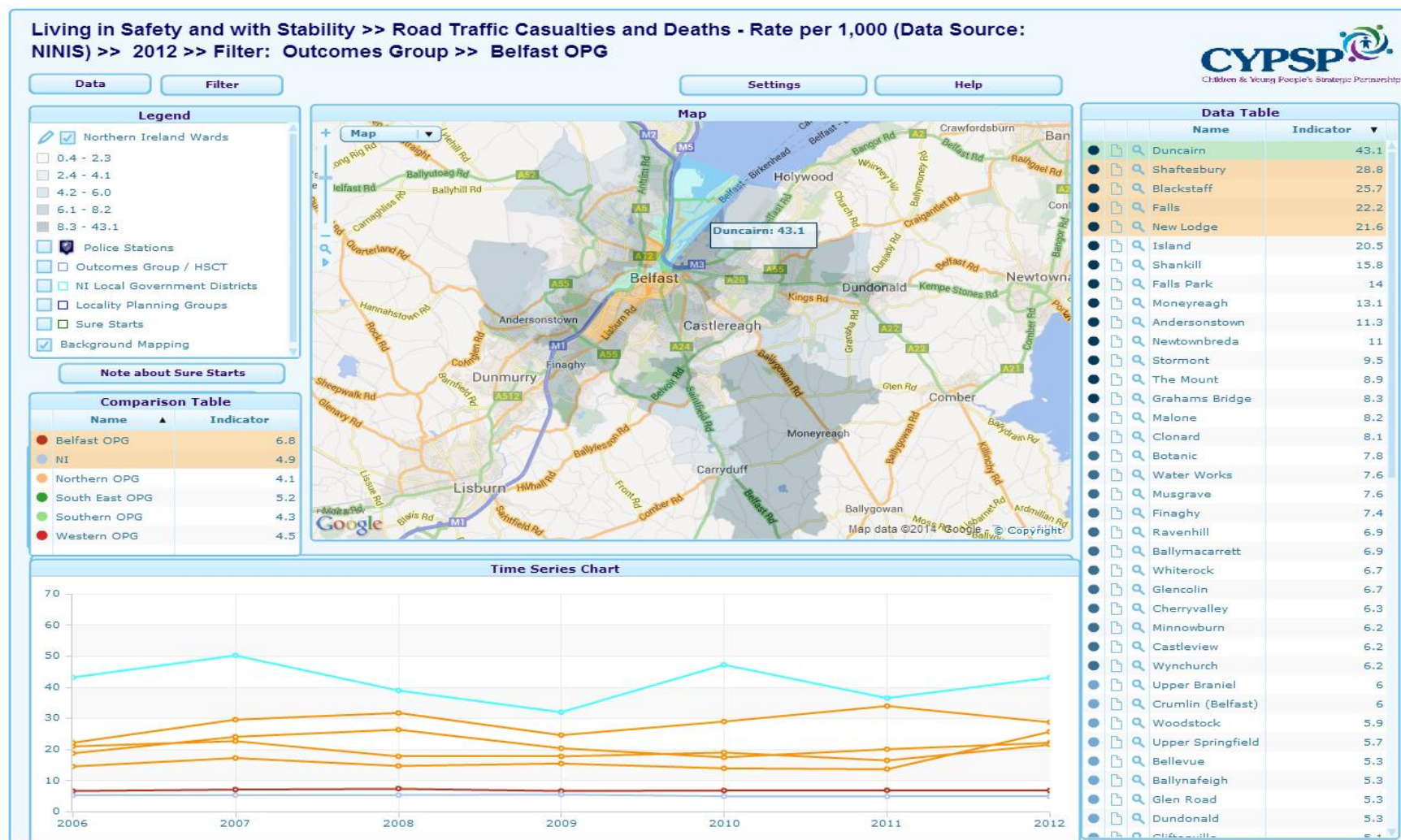

RATE PER 1000 ANTI-SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR INCIDENTS MAR 13

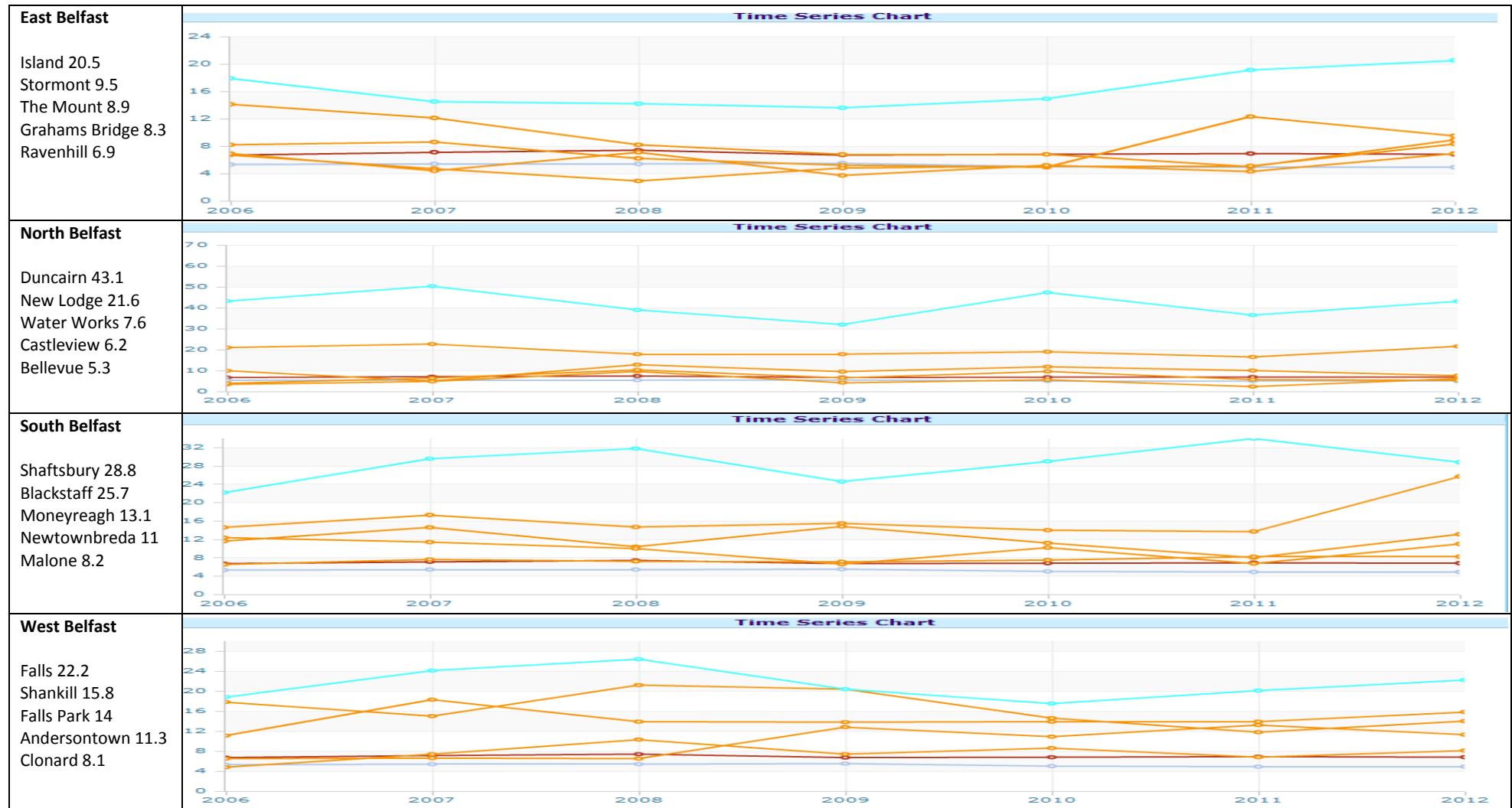

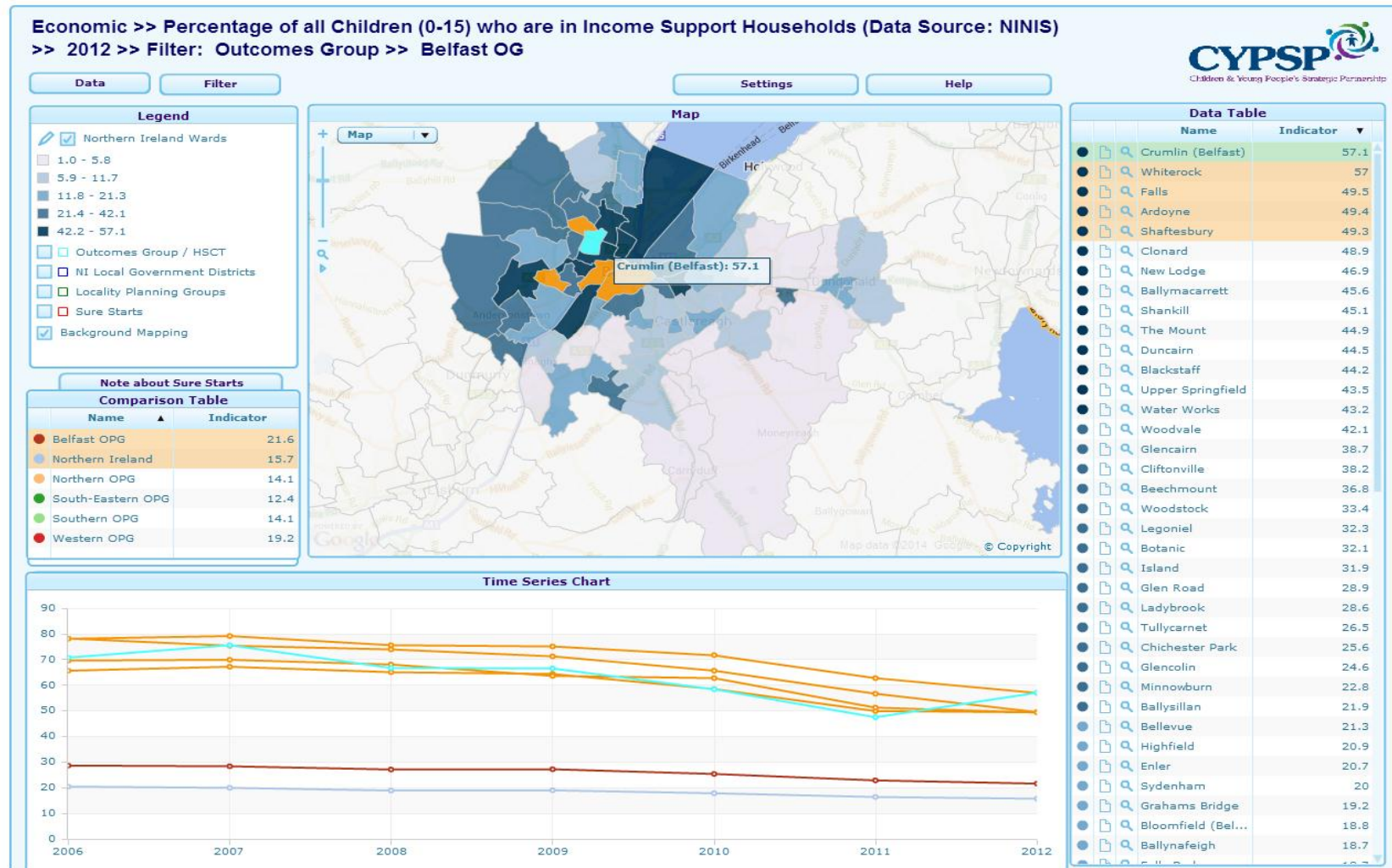

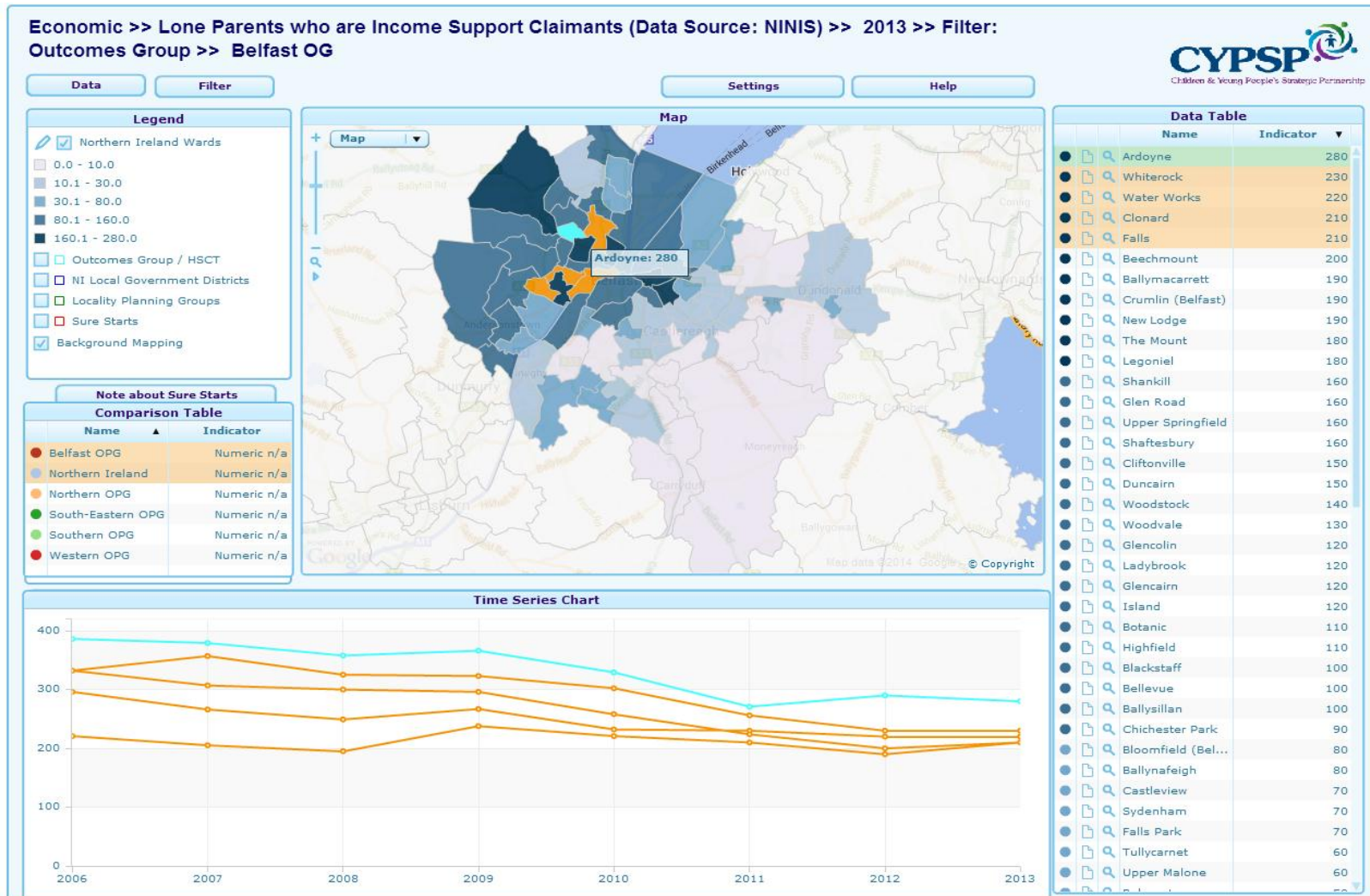

PERCENTAGE CHILDREN AGED 0 – 15 LIVING IN INCOME SUPPORT HOUSEHOLDS DEC 12

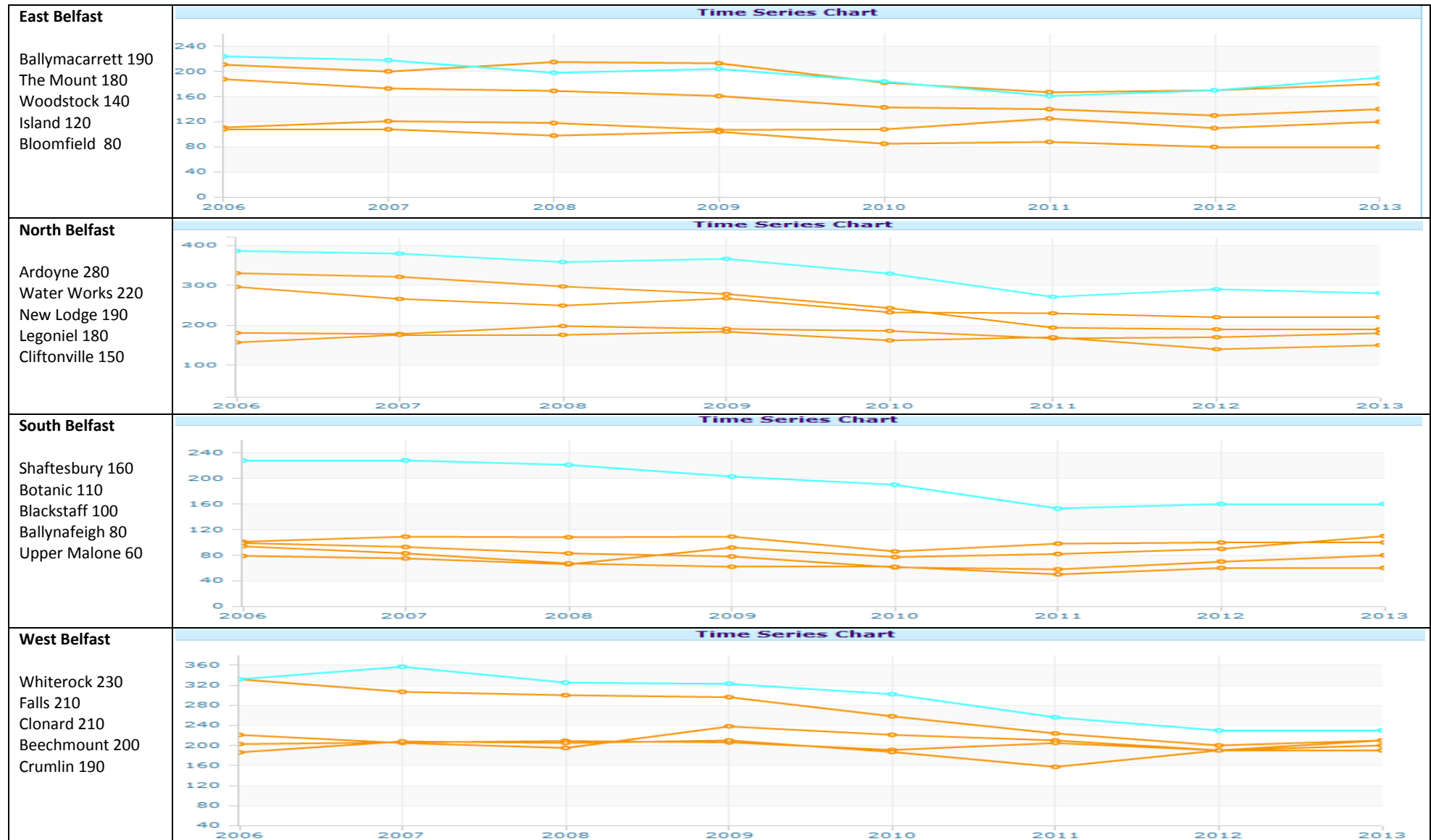

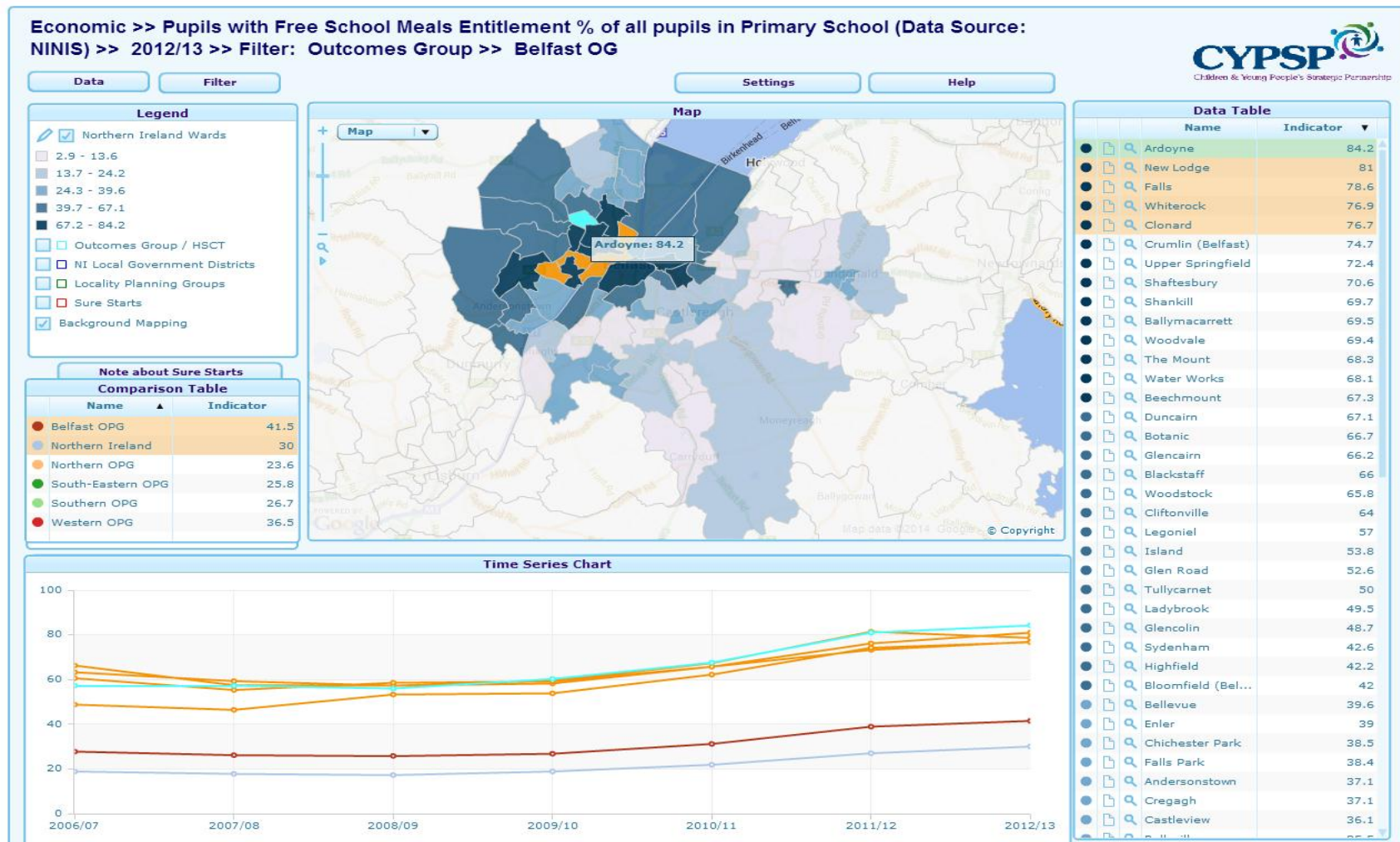

LONE PARENTS WHO ARE INCOME SUPPORT CLAIMANTS DEC 13

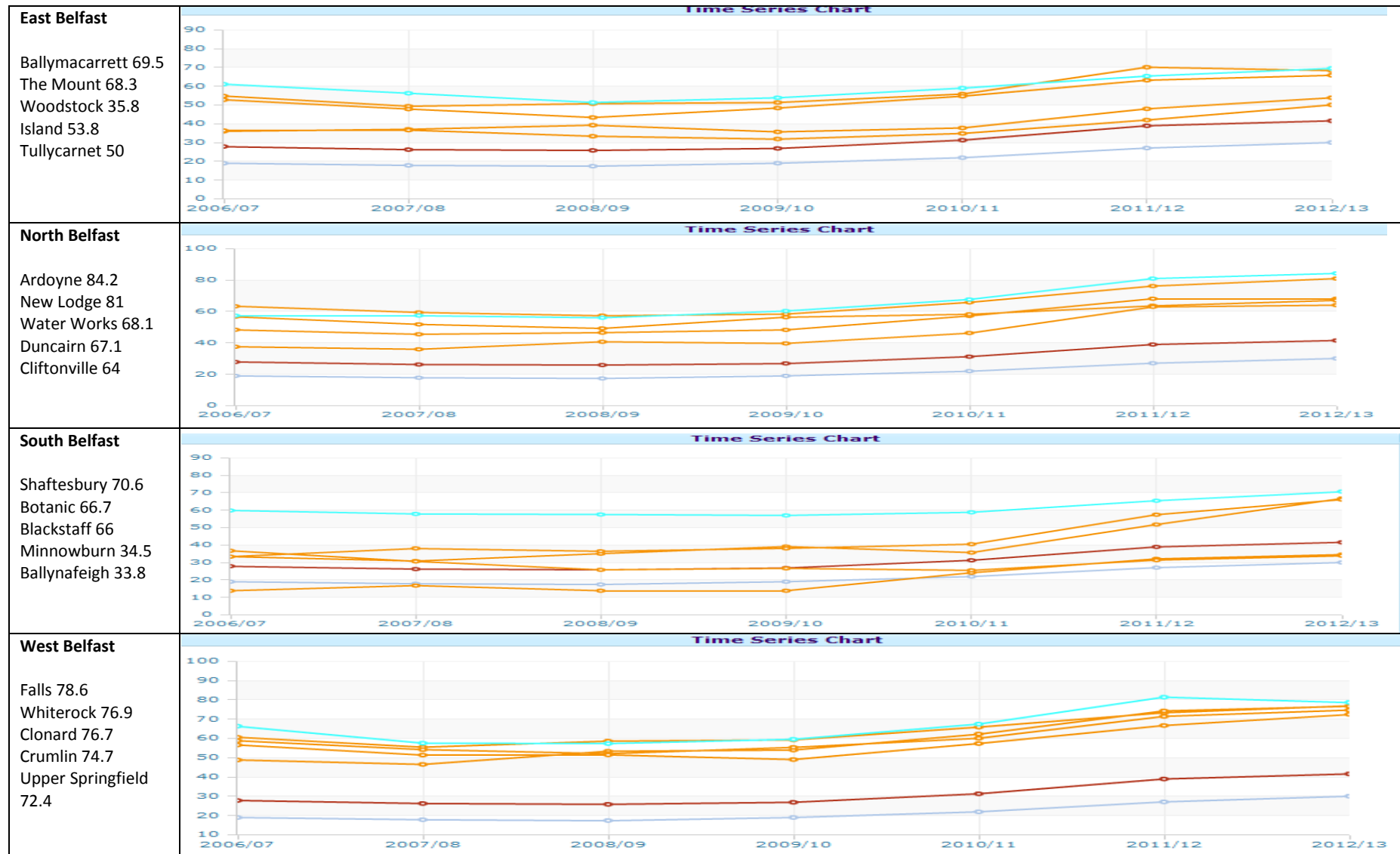

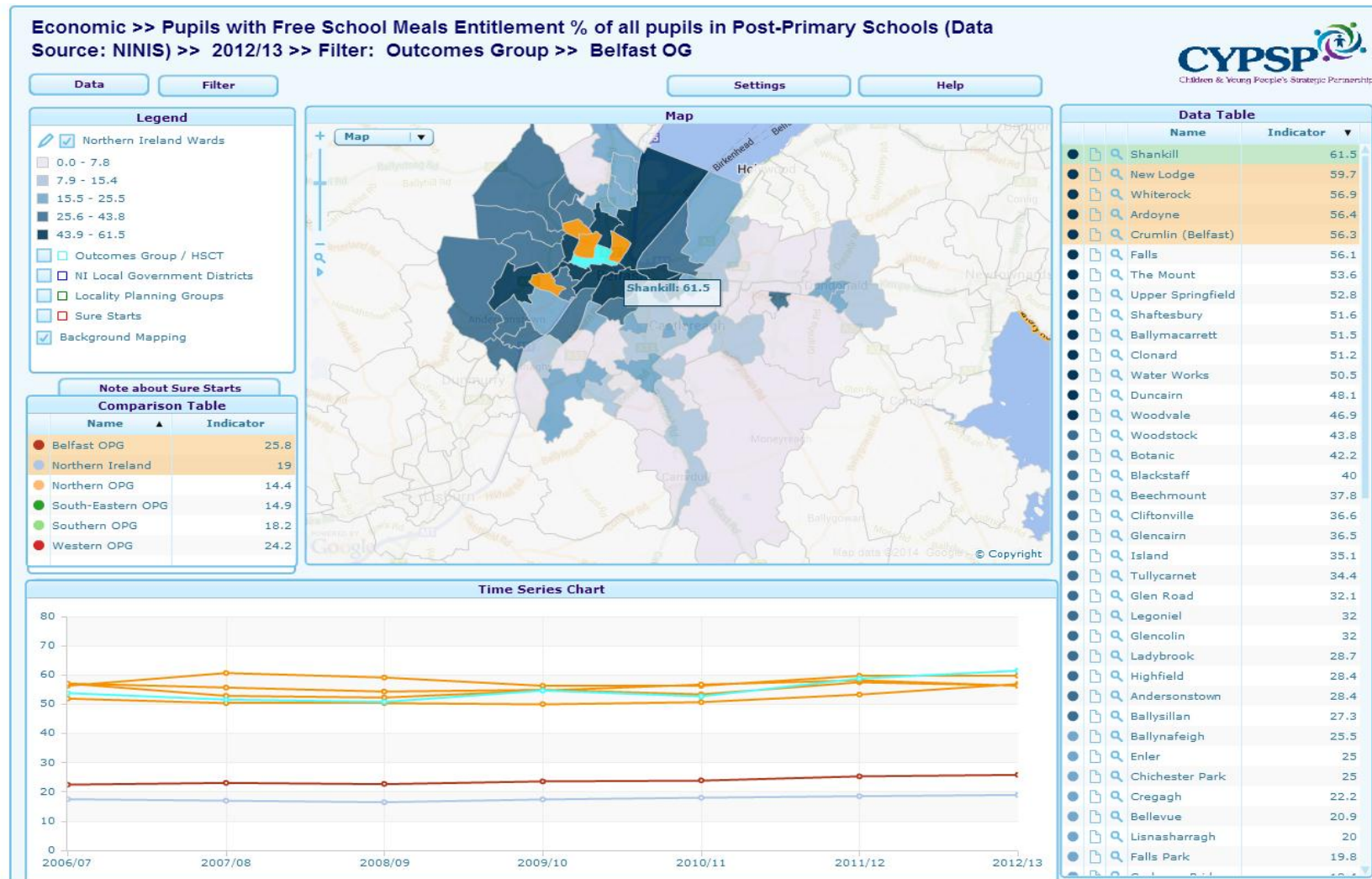

PERCENTAGE OF PRIMARY SCHOOL PUPILS WITH FREE SCHOOL MEAL ENTITLEMENT JUNE 13

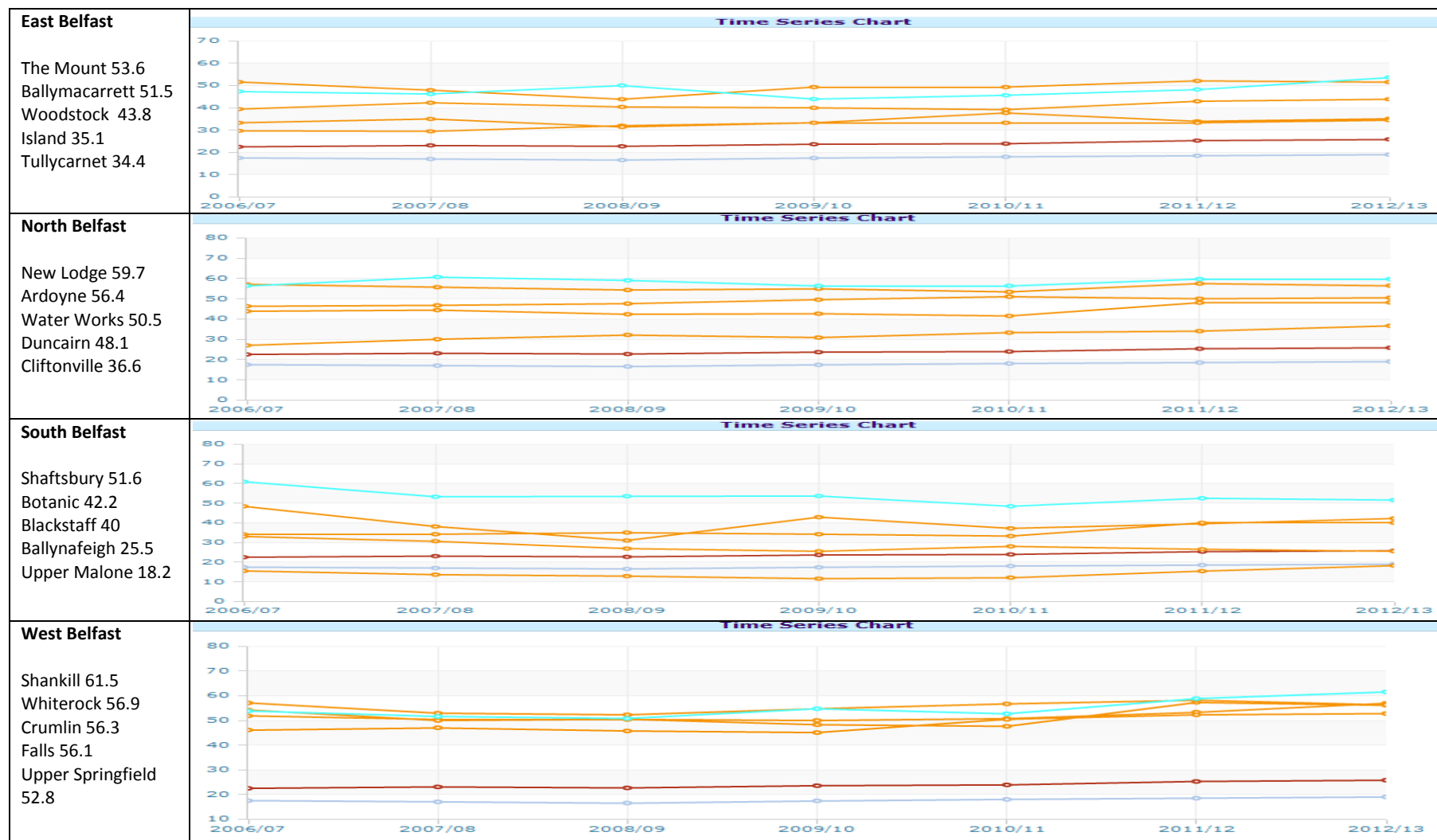

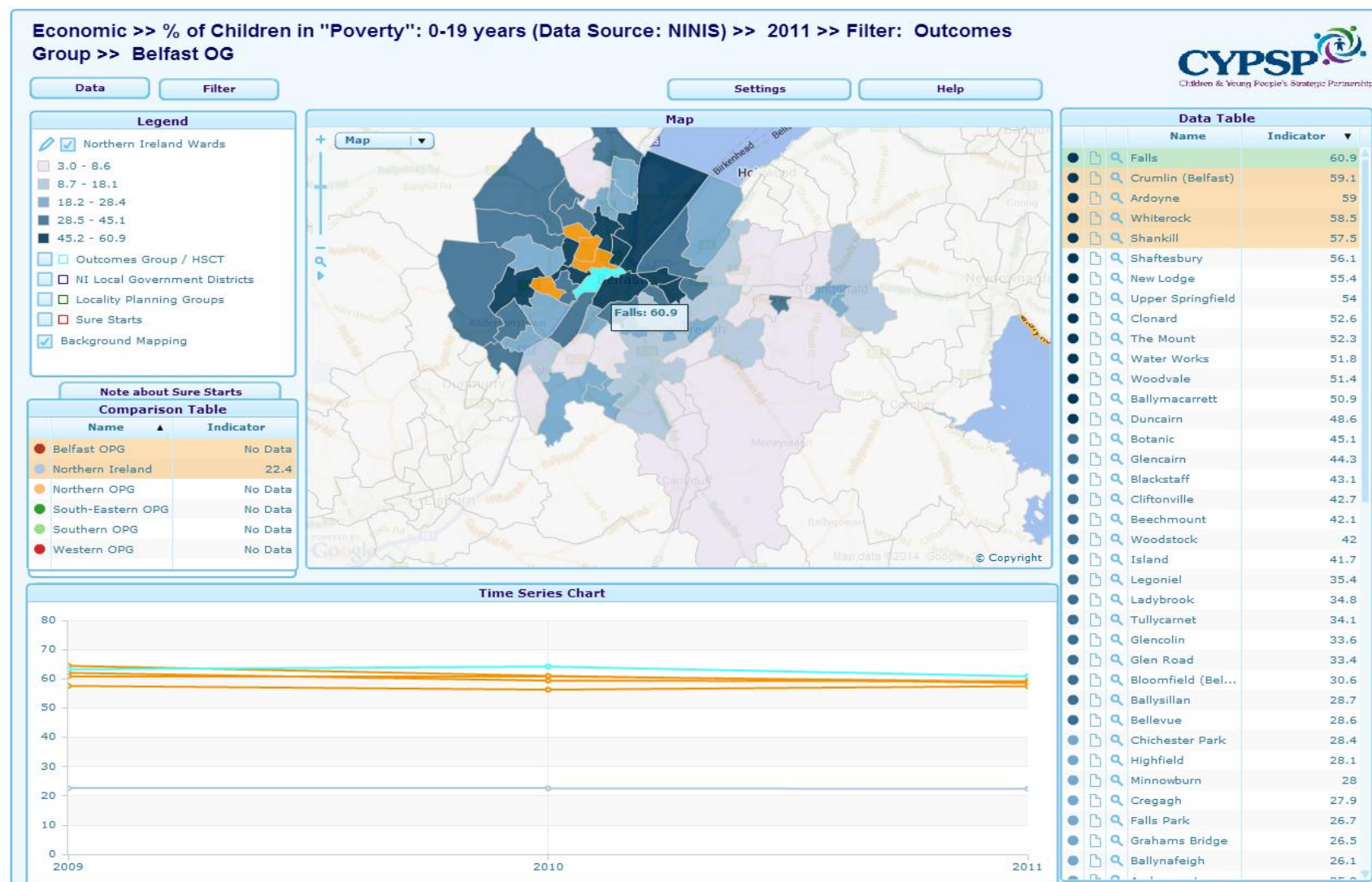

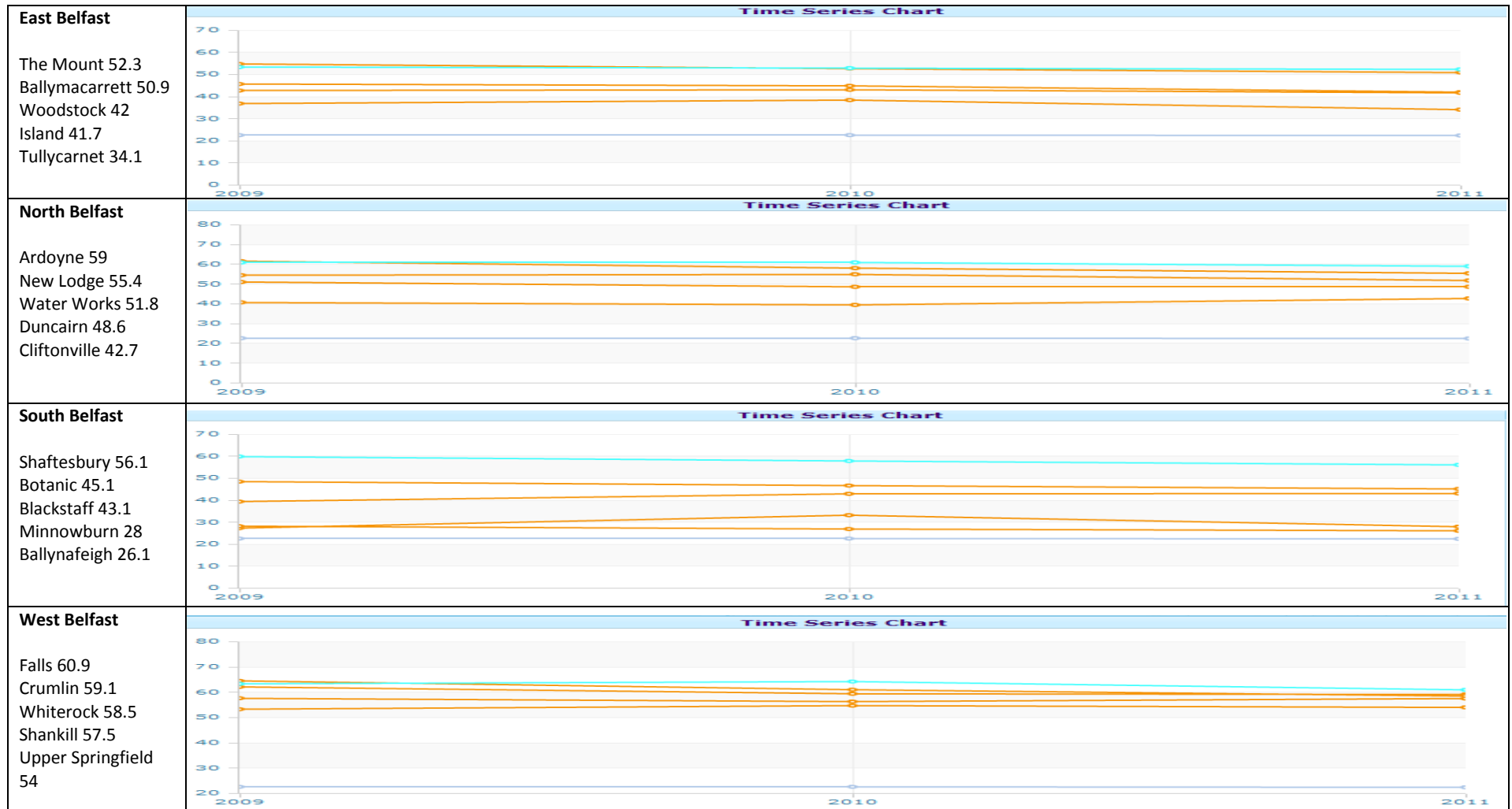
