

Report for Outcomes Board Meeting

- % of mothers smoking during pregnancy
- % of mothers breastfeeding at discharge
- % dental registrations for children aged 3-5
- No. of suicides per 10,000 population
- % of pupils with less than 85% attendance in post-primary schools
- % of school leavers achieving 5A*-C GCSE grades (or equivalent)
- Number of under 18 year olds on the Child Protection Register (per 10,000 population)
- Total number of offences with a domestic abuse motivation (per 10,000 population)
- No. of anti-social behaviour incidents (per 10,000 population)

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Next steps

- To highlight and reflect on the successes of CEIC over the last 3-4 years;
- Share some of the data (in an accessible format) to highlight some of the challenges facing the area moving forward;
- Renew the vision for CEIC and get community buy-in for moving forward on the priority indicators.
- Renewing the buy-in to the process of collaborative effort required to improve population well-being.

Following this event, we also plan to undertake a number of turning-the-curve exercises on some of the agreed priority indicators.
