Children's Services Cooperation Bill

- **Cooperate to improve children's wellbeing (2).** Children's authorities must cooperate with each other as far as is consistent with their children's functions. Children's authorities (defined statutory organisations) must also cooperate with other children's services providers (not a children's authority but any other person or body who provides a children's service)
- It requires the Executive to adopt a **Children and Young Persons Strategy** designed to improve wellbeing with a set of high level outcomes.
- The Bill creates an enabling power for organisations to **share resources and pool budgets.**



Children's Services Cooperation Bill

It also requires the Executive to prepare a **report** on what has been achieved through the strategy, how departments have worked together to improve outcomes. Also how children's authorities and other children's services providers have worked together to improve outcomes and suggestions as to how such cooperation could be improved.



Programme for Government 2016-21

- Collaboration-“It is a Programme for Government in which many more people and groups can play a part. The outcomes based approach creates an opportunity for collaborative working between organisations and groups in the public, voluntary and private sectors”
- Outcomes focussed-
 - current and desired outcomes
 - Indicators
 - Issues that matter to people
 - Focus on impact
 - partnership
- Early intervention- “investing in prevention and early intervention”



Programme for Government 2016-21

- **We Give our Children the Best Start in Life**
 - % babies born at low birth weight
 - % children at appropriate stage of development in their immediate pre-school year
 - % schools found to be good or better
 - Gap between % FSME school leavers and % FSME school leavers achieving at level 2 or above including English and maths
 - % school leavers who, aged 19, were in education, training or employment



Programme for Government 2016-21

- **We have a more equal society**
 - Gap between the highest and lowest deprivation quintile in healthy life expectancy at birth
 - %population living in absolute and relative poverty
- **We enjoy long healthy active lives**
 - Healthy life expectancy at birth
- **We have a safe community where we respect the law and each other**
 - Reoffending rate
- **We care for others and we help those in need**
 - % care leavers who aged 19, were in education, training or employment



What is CYPSP?



A multi agency partnership of senior representation of statutory/voluntary/community organisation, Councils and government departments involved in delivering services to children and families

A single partnership covers all of Northern Ireland



Purpose of CYPSP

To develop and maintain integrated planning and commissioning across agencies and sectors, aimed at improving wellbeing and the realization of rights of children in NI, in relation to the six outcomes for children:

1. Being healthy;
2. Enjoying, learning and achieving;
3. Living in safety and with stability;
4. Experiencing economic and environmental well-being;
5. Contributing positively to community and society; and
6. Living in a society which respects their rights



Legislative Mandate

The Children (1995 Order) (Amendment) (Children's Services Planning) Order 1998

Requires every Health and Social Services Board to prepare and publish plans for the provision of children's services within its area and to keep those plans under review. In preparing or updating its plans, a Health and Social Services Board is required to consult Health and Social Services trusts, education and library boards, district councils, certain voluntary organisations, the Northern Ireland Housing Executive, the Probation Board for Northern Ireland, the police and other relevant bodies. The Department of Health and Social Services may require a Health and Social Services Board's plan to be submitted to it at any time.

- **Promote integrated provision of service and effective use of available resources**
- **Facilitate joint commissioning by agencies when it is seen as appropriate to meet the needs of children**
- **Ensure consistency of approach to planning**



Principles of CYPSP

Being clear that what we do makes a difference through **Outcomes based planning and delivery**

Using **evidence** to underpin planning-Using multi-agency information to drive commissioning and demonstrate impact and effectiveness

Inclusion of children, young people and families in planning and design of services

Incorporation of **children's rights** in planning and delivery of services

Focusing on **Earlier Intervention**

Working to deliver greater **collaboration** and less overlap through **integrated planning and commissioning**



How CYPSP works

Planning groups, both regional and local, finding out how well children and young people in their area or group are doing against the High level Outcomes.

The planning groups are looking at

- Statistical information
- The experience of children and young people and families
- The practice knowledge of front line staff
- What research tells us
- Information from Family Support Hubs

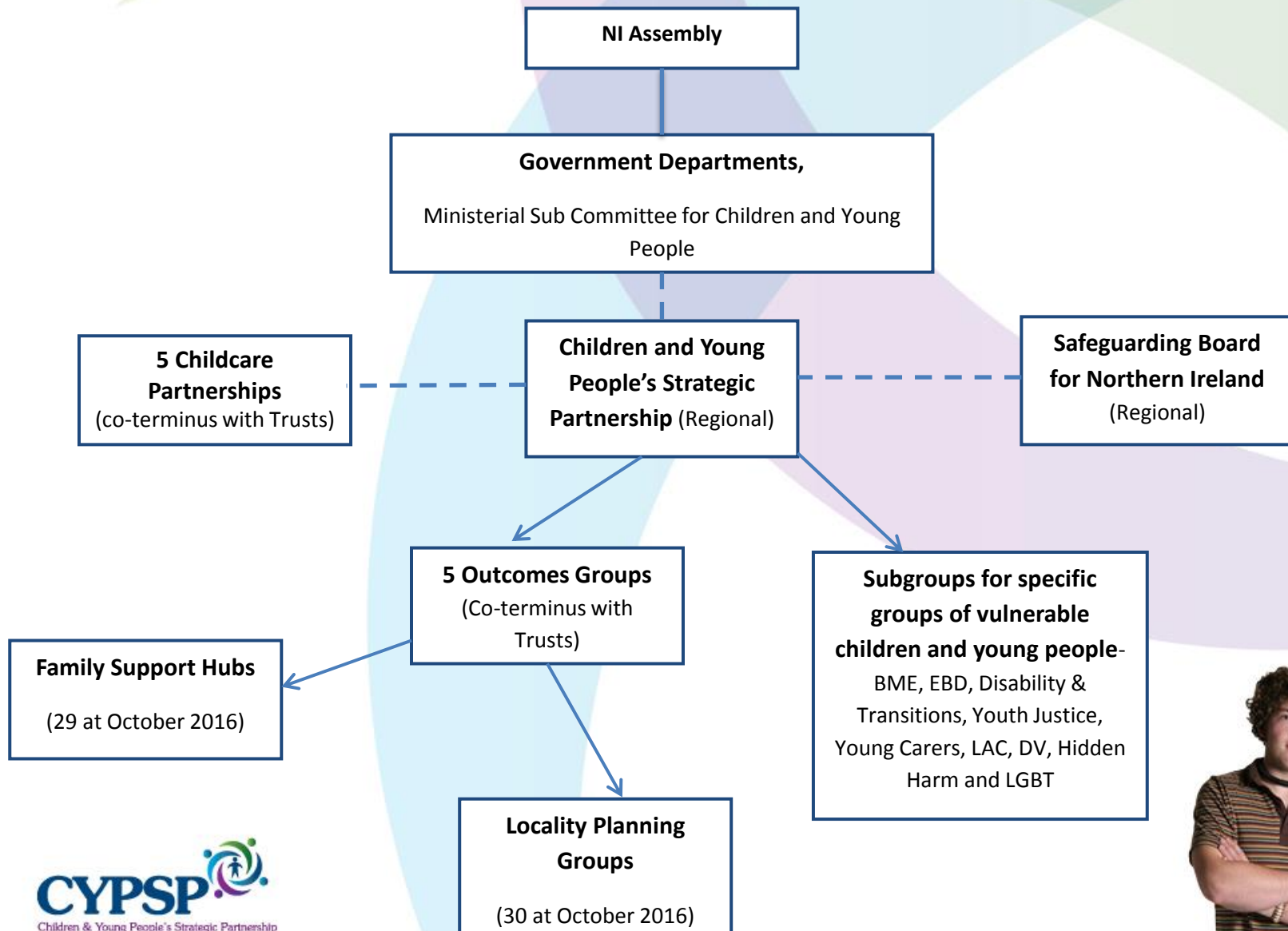


How CYPSP works

Through Partnership working they are also looking at what supports and services currently exist, so that they can work out what needs to be changed, especially how such supports and services should be coordinated to improve children's outcomes.



CYPSP Structure



CYPSP Structure-Regional subgroups

Carry out integrated planning for specific groups of vulnerable children and young people on a **regional** basis

Specific emphasis on sharing resources across agencies to improve outcomes for children and young people:

- BME
- Children with Disabilities and Transitions
- Children Young People and Offending
- Think Family (with HSCB)
- LGBT Young People (with PHA)
- LAC 16+
- Young Carers
- Children and Young People with Emotional and Behavioural Difficulties

5 multi agency planning groups at level of Health and Social Care Trusts

Integrated planning and commissioning using information System

Support to Family Support Hubs and Locality Groups

Linking with other planning partnerships to avoid duplication



CYPSP Structure - Locality Groups

- 30 Locality Planning Groups developing low cost and no cost solutions to local problems
- Raising awareness of family support service and building a local constituency of support
- Linking communities, politicians with local services
- Embedding outcomes based planning in local communities
- Dialogue with community about service planning and development

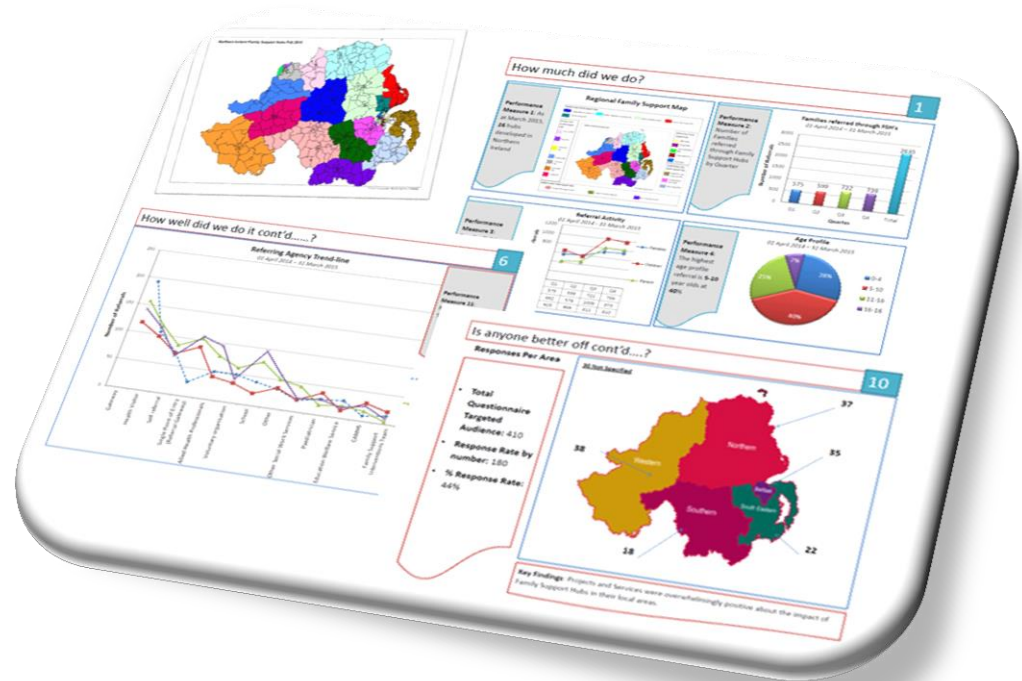

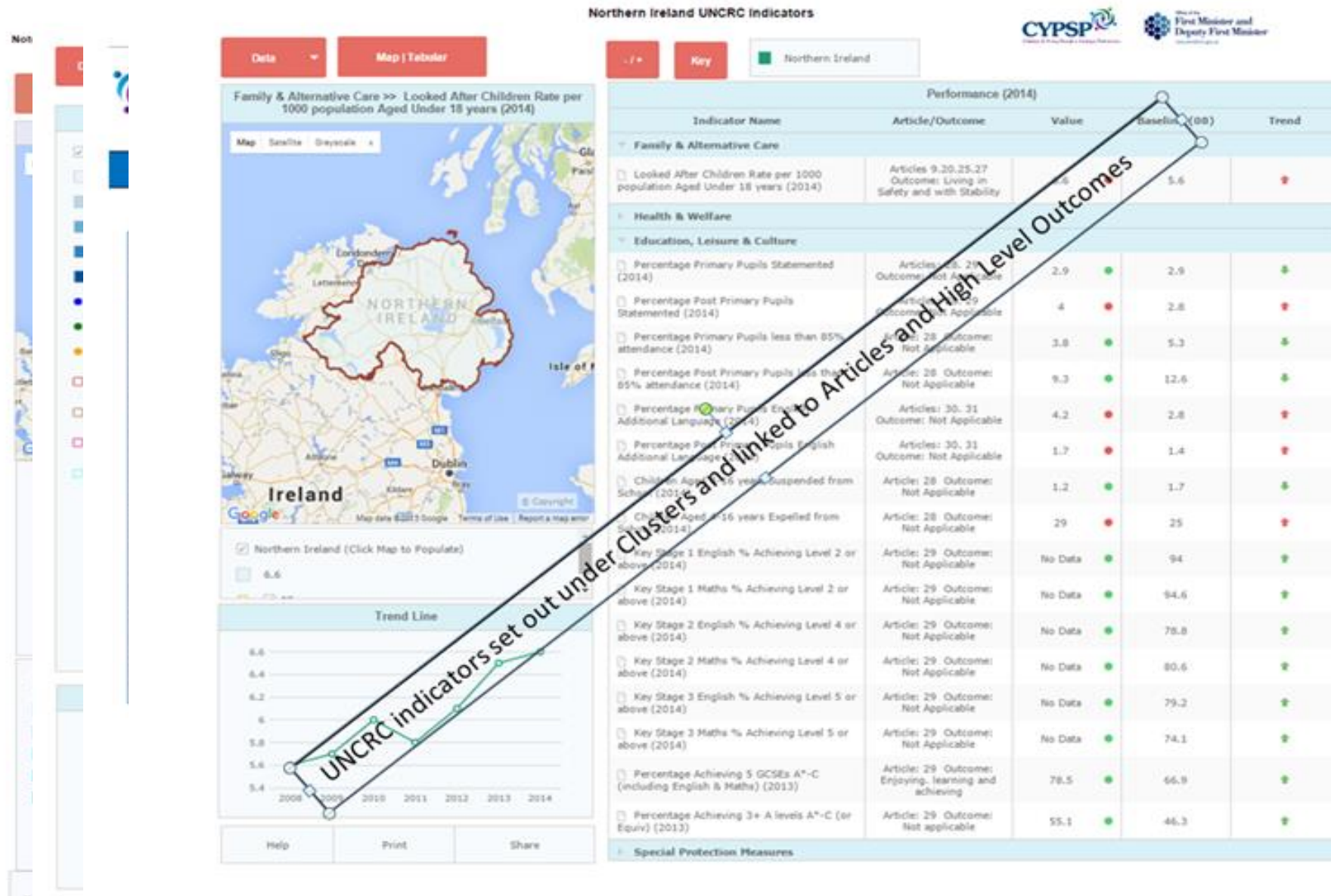

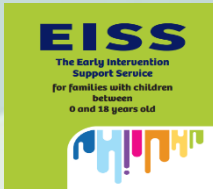
Health Subgroup: Dental Action Plan Achievements in 2015/16

Early Intervention Service (EIS)






- Aim of Early Intervention Support Service (EISS): **To support families when problems first emerge before they become embedded or statutory services are required**
- Five pilot EISS regionally being provided by a range of voluntary organisations including Action for Children, Barnardo's, NIACRO & SPACE.
- EISS are aligned to Family Support Hub(s) – EISS in SE Area - North Down & Ards Family Support Hub
- EISS will provide support for 1,925 families between August 2015 – April 2018
- **Features of this service include;** Key worker assigned to family, Short term intervention up to approximately 12 weeks, Provides therapeutic & practical support, Family Group Conferencing for 5% of families, Access to Incredible Years & Strengthening Family Parenting Programmes , Refers to FSH for multiagency input if additional support required
- Outcomes Based Accountability Framework to measure impact

South Eastern DACT Action Plan for 2016 has 4 key themes:

- Men's health
- Sports clubs project
- Teacher training on hidden harm
- Drug disposal bins

SEDACT Actions relating to children, young people and families:

1. Steps to Cope is an intervention for young people affected by parental alcohol use and measuring impact by measuring increased resilience
2. Alcohol and You is working on a brief advice tool for parenting and alcohol
3. Raising Awareness across the sector – Ensure south eastern outcomes group members have a good understanding of drug and alcohol services with particular attention to young people's treatment services, targeted prevention and family support that are available

Police and Community Safety Partnerships

Lisburn and Castlereagh PCSP

Priorities:

1. Reducing anti-social behaviour, addressing the effects of drugs and alcohol as a contributing factor in crime and anti-social behaviour, increase reporting of Domestic Abuse incidents and provide support to the victims, increase confidence in policing;
 2. Reduce the fear of crime, especially vulnerable groups including addressing hate crime, road safety, reduce burglaries, business and retail crime
- Completing a Survey of Young People's Perceptions of Anti-Social Behaviour in their Area
 - Small Grants £500-£5000 available - Deadline end of February 2017
 - Drug Disposal RAPID Bin Launch

Ards and North Down PCSP
