

WHAT IS A CFC?

A child friendly city or community is a place where the voices, needs, priorities and rights of children are considered and taken seriously.



In a Child Friendly City all children:

- Have a say about decisions that affect them
- Can express their views freely and are encouraged and supported to do that
- Can access good health, education, transport and other services
- Feel safe and protected from discrimination and harm
- Can enjoy public spaces and meet other children freely



AN INTRODUCTION TO CHILD RIGHTS IN PRACTICE



Overview:

This practical and interactive session offers a robust introduction to the subject of children's human rights as enshrined in the UN Convention the Rights of the Child. For anyone who has previously completed introductory level training, it will offer a comprehensive refresher and an opportunity to deepen knowledge and understanding of the subject.

The session comprises a mix of theory, group discussions and case study-based activities. Each training session is customised to meet the needs of its specific audience.

Learning outcomes:

- Gain knowledge and understanding of children's human rights
- Gain a sound understanding of the meaning and principles of a child rights-based approach (CRBA)
- Begin to explore the practical application of a CRBA to your work with/for children and young people
