
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
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Priority 1: Building Capacity within Communities to Connect Families to Early Help Networks


Increase take up rates of services across FS hubs and other early help networks



A total of **11,476** families have been referred and supported by family support hubs




A total of 16,670 children have been referred and supported by family support hubs




Family Support Services continue to be delivered during the pandemic – **3937** children from the Belfast area with a disability accessed family support services.

Families have improved access to support at the point of need



Percentage of Children Living in Absolute Low Income Poverty Before Housing Costs





Priority 2: Giving Children the Best Start in Life (Transitions)

BAOG currently invests £500k per annum in early help services to support the work of the hubs, focusing on Home visiting based supports, mentoring and smaller amounts of resource aligned around work to support families impacted upon by disabilities.

While the pandemic has impacted upon delivery over particular periods of time in year, for particular providers, we can report that all contractors have shown significant commitment and innovation to their contract delivery and delivered satisfactory performance over the course of the 2020/21 financial year.


Joint Initiatives

The membership of the four Locality Planning Groups in Belfast, made up of organisations both large and small, have been made key contributions in the delivery of community responses made to the current pandemic since March 2020 across Belfast.

By Summer 2020, each Locality Planning Group had established an anti-poverty sub group, which has provided a forum for members to reflect on the impact of different activity, designed to mitigate the impact of the pandemic, in their respective locality areas. They have also provided a forum for feedback on emerging needs and areas of work where LPG members felt current delivery could be built upon.

On November 25th a city meeting of the anti-poverty sub group chairs was convened, under the auspices of the Locality Planning structures. The purpose of the meeting was to explore whether there were any common initial areas of activity that could usefully be progressed collaboratively via LPG's. Read More
