This is a challenge in terms of both sustaining and developing early help capacity within current contracting frameworks. Sense of frustration across the partners on the perceptions that statutory bodies are not leveraging the potential for positive change that the pandemic showed and risk slipping back into business as normal mode remains evident. There is a continuing sense of urgency around embedding innovative and bespoke activity e.g. aligned spend models undertaken across the pandemic period into the 'new normal' going forward. 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		This demand pattern appears to broadly track the in year increases in referral to BHSCT's Gateway service 22/23 which are also 20+% higher in year by Q3. Emotional Health and well Being issues among pre and primary school age children, alongside developmental pressures eg. (Speech, socialisation) and families presenting as struggling with routines and behaviours appear to be the most salient features of this cycle. This aligns with reports from Child Health colleagues in BHSCT and other mainstream services. These increased demand trends add to the pressures on response capacity in Children's Services, CAMHS and CWD early help/ step 1 services across the Outcomes area. This demand adds to the existing workforce pressures with the impact of, lengthening waiting lists, shifting thresholds and displaced demand adding to the complexity and risk in the hub environment. A strong continuing need for practical help initiatives, particularly to support (Low paid) working families remains an ongoing pressure, with v little central funding to tap into. 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Northern Area	Maura Dargan	Can we talk? conference organised jointly with mid Ulster LG and Dungannon LG held in Cookstown to increase awareness of mental health & emotional wellbeing issues for children & young people and highlight support services available across the Mid Ulster Council area. 93 people from across statutory/community/voluntary sectors attended with 26 information stalls present. NI Children & Young People's Commissioner Koulla Yiasouma was keynote speaker. Runner up in NHSCT Chairperson's Award- Population Health and Wellbeing for Northern PANTS Campaign (a simple conversation to help keep your child safe from sexual abuse. Save the Children Family support initiative – with commitment from local council from October 2022 the programme has received 189 family applications and supported 389 children to date within the Northern area. 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South Eastern Area	Lyn Preece	Children's Disability Services Children's Disability Services within the Trust has made a number of achievements relating to its capacity to deliver an increased continuum of Residential placements for young people requiring medium to long term residential care placements. Notably the care trajectory has increased by more than 100% in the last year where by the Trust has to accommodate 11 young people within residential care. This involved repurposing an existing Short Breaks Home to accommodate a number of young people. Additional finance of £500k was secured through a business to the SPPG to augment the staffing compliment of the home to ensure a robust permanent staff team with appropriate skills mix can be recruited. The COVID response witnessed the development of an outreach support model to support young people remaining in their homes through the deployment of support staff to the communities. Children's Services is undertaking a structural review of services to determine which sub directorate the service best sits under and hoe connections with the broader primary health provision can be strengthened. Additional funding has been received to enhance the accessibility of AHPs for Children within Special Schools and to develop a regional tiered model of service provision.
